The fire bell will ring every evening 15 minutes before the hour.

All records of camp meeting collections were broken at Old Orchard, Maine, Sunday, when Rev. Dr. A. B. Canadian inventors will have their ambition excited by the recent sale, by the Diamond Match Co., of Chicago, of patent match making machinery and rights to European Governments.

That company received \$600,000 from the French Government, and \$800,000 from the Italian Government, and it is reported that they will receive similar sums from Germany, Austria-Hungary and other countries.

Five years ago the science of converting logs into matches was said to be a finished science, incapable of further improvement, but American ingenuity has shown that what was "perfect work" in 1891 will not answer for 1896. 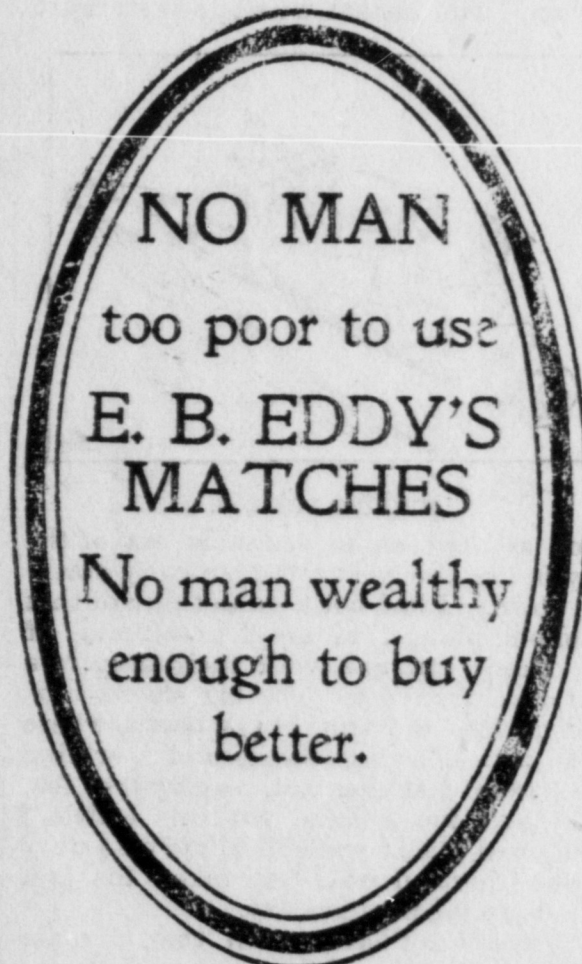
