### A Terrible Experience

[Cardiff Western Mail, Sept 30]

The hardships and dangers of the sailor's life are strikingly illustrated by the experience of the crew of the Norwegian barque Prince Charlie, of Drammen, which arrived by the morning tide on Thursday and now lies in the Roath Dock. The decks of the vessel are below the water and some three feet of the bulwarks alone remain visible. The ship, which sailed from Quebec, was laden with timber for Cardiff. She was under the command of Captain Gronneberg, of Christiania. The crew, numbering eighteen, were composed mainly of Norwegians, but there was one Englishman aboard and seven Russians. The Prince Charlie, which was 201 feet long, 40 feet broad and 24 feet in depth, was built at St. Martins, New Brunswick, in 1864. When she left Quebec, we learn, she was one of the best fitted barques from Norway. The voyage, until the coast of Ireland was sighted, was an uneventful one. On Monday, whilst off Cape Clear, a terrific storm struck the vessel, and after six hours' buffeting she sprang a leak. In a short time there were several feet of water in the hold. The pumps were manned, but, notwithstanding all the efforts of the crew, the water continued to gain. By Tuesday morning there was over ten feet of water in the hold, and the waves began to break over her decks. By mid-day the decks were on a level with the water, and then began a most terrible experience for the unfortunate men. Washed out of their quarters, they were obliged to almost live on deck. There were three sick men on board, and there was no place to move into. The captain's cabin was washed out by terrific seas, and there was not a dry rag of any sort in the vessel. This terrible exposure has so affected the sick men that they are now in a dying condition. Through Tuesday night and Wednesday, until the vessel reached the Bristol Channel, there was no fire on board, and all the food, etc., had to be served cold. At every pitch of the vessel the deckload of timber heaved, and she was in danger of going to pieces at any moment.

### Retires From Leadership.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Earl of Rosebery has written to Thomas E. Ellis, Liberal member of parliament for Merionethshire and first Liberal whip, saying that he has resigned the leadership of the Liberal party. Lord Rosebery says in the course of his letter: "The recent course of events makes it necessary to clear the air. I find myself in apparent difference with a considerable mass of Liberals on the Eastern question, and there is the same conflict of opinion with Mr. Gladstone, who must necessarily always exercise matchless authority in the party, while scarcely from any quarter do I receive explicit support. This situation, except as it regards Mr. Gladstone, is not altogether new. But I complain of no one, and I always regret that I should appear to divide the energies as to try the faith of the Liberals."

Archibald Philip Primrose, Earl of Rosebery, is now about 49 years of age, and has held the earldom since 1868. It was at the opening of parliament in 1871 that he made his first public speech, and since that time he has been prominent in British politics. He was president of the social science congress of 1874 and was made lord rector of Edinburgh University in 1880. Mr. Gladstone, from Lord Rosebery's first appearance in public life, regarded him as possessed of extraordinary ability, and in 1886 he appointed him secretary of state for foreign affairs. He resigned the portfolio to accept the chairmanship of the London county council. He was foreign secretary of the cabinet when called to the premiership.

### Travels Of The Pen.

Has it ever struck you what a distance your pen travels every time you write a letter, or even when you sign your name? If not, here are some figures that will astonish you. Each word you write is about an inch long; some words, of course, are very much less, but the average of all your words is as nearly as possible an inch in length. Taking into consideration, however, the numerous curves made in forming each letter, your pen travels the space of about three inches in every word.

Now, if you are a fairly rapid writer, you will write thirty words per minute. That is to say, every minute your pen travels a distance of seven and one-half feet, or one hundred and fifty yards in the hour. Clerks, or those who wield the pen at all vigorously, write at least half a mile a day, or about one hundred and twenty miles in the working year.

### Odds and Ends.

Immense deposits of asbestos have been discovered in the Ferris range of mountains, in Caribou county, Wyoming.

In South Africa the High Commissioner, the Governor of Natal, and the Agent General at Pretoria are all Irishmen.

In London there are 2,127 feather-curlers alone, 4,507 artificial flower-makers, 4,075 umbrella and walking stick makers.

A raft of logs has been successfully towed from Stella, Wash., to San Francisco. It was 528 feet long, 52 feet broad at its middle point, and 31 feet deep.

Great Britain has a long lead in the export of bicycles. In the month of July last alone over \$5,000,000 worth of wheels was sent abroad from that busy country.

During the six months ending June 30 there was exported to this country from the Manchester (England) district, a total of 792,994 pounds of all sorts of yarn and twine.

Over 1,000 ships of all kinds and sizes pass up and down the English channel every 24 hours, and there are scarcely ever less than 200 near Land's End, leaving or bearing up for the channel.

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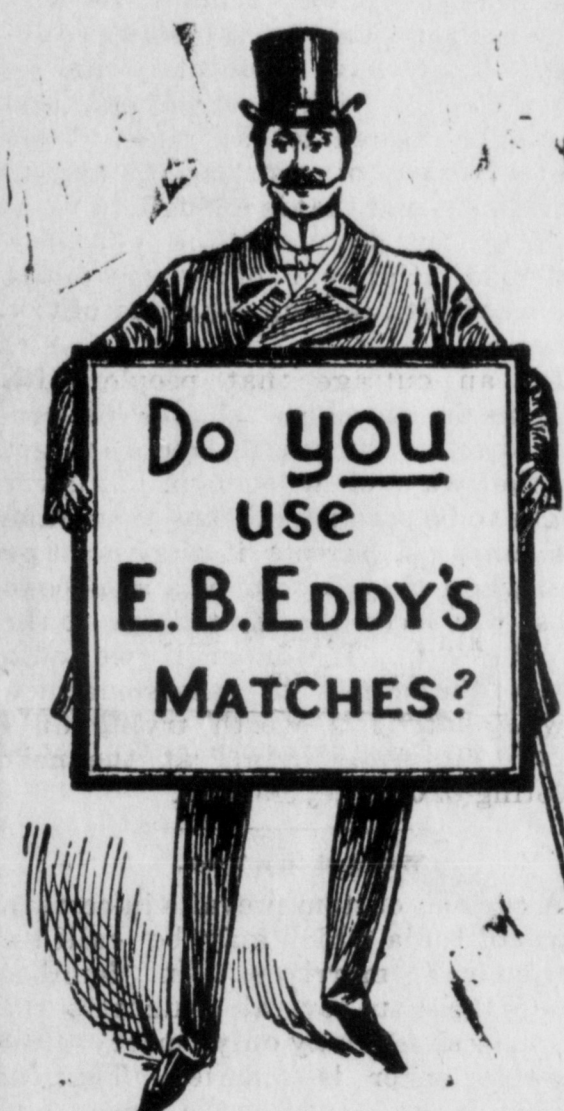
