IMPORTANT JUDGEMENT. - A recent judgment by the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in a case arising in Albert County, Prescott vs. Garland, decides that what are commonly known as lien notes are not in law promissory notes, but are agreements and cannot therefore be sued in a justice's court.

As these agreements have been largely used in the sale, of farm machinery, sewing machines, musical instruments and similar goods and as numerous judgments have been entered up on them in justice's courts throughout the province, the decision will probably have an important effect in the recovery of these judgments.

These it was stated were bequeathed to Mr Forbes by the deceased who died of wounds received at the battle of Enremada, Cuba, and his effects were transferred t the Bankers by Gen. Gomez, commander of the Insurgent army to be forwarded to Mr. Forbes. The letter further stated that as the deceased died in arms against the Spanish government his estate would be forfeited to the Crown, and that to avoid this the executors had transferred the effects to their American correspondent at Pensacola, by one of the Cuba tobacco vessels, who on receipt of one pound sterling to pay expenses, would forward Mr. Forbes the property.
