Rev. Mr. Hamilton's Farewell.

The Rev. Wm. Hamilton, pastor of the Presbyterian church for the last eleven years and four months, preached his farewell sermon in Chalmers church, last Sunday evening to a large and attentive congregation, taking for his text the words, "It is finished" found in John 19.20. He treated the subject in a masterly and scholarly manner and said it was in substance, the first discourse he had delivered from this pulpit and that he was prompted to preach from this text, as he desired to set before the people the doctrine of Christ's atoning death, believing it to be the foundation truth of all evangelical preaching and teaching, and a ministry though brilliant and attractive, if it had not this truth, must be destitute of all spiritual power. He felt, though conscious of many shortcomings, that he could not charge himself with neglect in bringing and keeping before his people the atoning work of Christ. In closing, he made a strong appeal to any who were still strangers to Christ to rely upon "His" finished work for acceptance with God and to become reconciled to God through Christ. During his pastorate of eleven years and four months Mr. Hamilton has occupied his pulpit on 421 Sabbaths, and with the exception of five or six, all the discourses delivered by him were fully written out. He paid 8566 pastoral visits and traveled by wagon and sleigh in the prosecution of parochial duty about 34,691 miles, officiated at 333 baptisms, at 198 funerals and at 95 marriages, 181 persons have been admitted to the fellowship of the church, the communion roll is proportionately larger than ever before in the history of the congregation, and the givings of the congregation for the schemes of the church, though far short of what they should be, are at least equal to what they have been at any former period of its history. He wished soon to hear of a pastor of evangelical spirit and manly and Christlike character being settled over the people here. After the service many friends remained to shake hands with their beloved pastor and to wish him a happy and successful New Year in his new field of work which he is to take up in the neighboring province of Nova Scotia.
