A Vindication.

To the Richibucto Review:

In my paper lately read before the Kingston Agricultural Society I exceedingly regret that in trying to condense the subjects therein mentioned, instead of treating them more exhaustively, that some one or more of them appear ambiguous, while the table accompanying the same, on which I devoted so much time and care, is so mutilated by the printer that it is worse than useless, as it is entirely misleading. In compiling this table I considered it would be of some service to the members of the society in compounding the different foods raised on the farm into the proper feeding ratio of 1.5.4, so that everything thin to the stock should be to the best advantage.

Where cotton-seed meal is treated on in the paper it is likely I handled the subject so loosely as to convey the idea that if a ton of it should be fed to stock with other coarse food the whole manure pile would be worth \$30.74 per ton. This would be so unreasonable as to border on the ridiculous. A pile of manure from animals fed on Swedish turnips alone (which of course is improper feeding) is worth 91 cents per ton, while a pile of manure from animals fed on cotton-seed meal alone (which is also improper feeding) is worth \$30.74 per ton. So a person knowing the manurial value of the different articles fed his stock, by a little figuring can estimate the fertilizing value of his manure pile, if he has taken the precaution of allowing none to go to waste. Many persons consider manure is manure, no matter from what it is derived and so it is. Money is also money, but there is as much difference in manure as there is between gold and copper.

My time and thought at the present is so pre-occupied with matter of so much more importance, that I cannot devote more of it just now to this subject and trust that in this short article I have made myself comprehensible. If not, at some future time, I will only be too glad to rectify any omissions or incomprehensible statements made in the paper mentioned. I. W. DOHERTY.

Awful Accident.

DORCHESTER, Jan. 26.—A terrible accident happened to the express from Halifax, due at Moncton at one o'clock this afternoon.

The train was approaching Dorchester about a half hour late. When within a mile of the station at a point known as Palmer's Pond, the whole train excepting the engine and tender, left the rails and went over an embankment seventy-five feet high.

In the confusion it was thought she was the only person killed but examination revealed that a postal clerk, Arthur C. Edgecombe, was pinioned in his car. His body was released with difficulty. It was very little bruised, but it is thought his back was broken, as his body was all doubled up.
