

—DUTCHER MURDER.

Sullivan's Trial Commenced at Dorchester To-day.

MONCTON, Jan. 12.—The trial of John E. Sullivan for murders of Mrs. Dutcher and Harris Dutcher comes up to-day at Dorchester and this morning's train conveyed a large number of the legal fraternity, jurymen and witnesses interested in the same. On Monday afternoon's C. P. R. train was Solicitor General White, who, with F. A. McCully as associate counsel will conduct the case for the crown, while R. B. Smith will appear for the prisoner.

Sullivan, who has been incarcerated in Dorchester jail since Oct. 3rd, appears to take matters very easy and seems confident that he can prove that he had no complicity whatever in the horrible crime which is laid to his charge. His counsel is of similar opinion, and the outcome of the case is awaited with deep interest.

Maggie Dutcher is at present in Sussex with her nurse, and it is understood she will be one of the last witnesses called on.

It will be remembered that the evidence given by Mrs. John McCann, of St. John, created no little amount of excitement. She swore positively that John E. Sullivan was at her house four days after the tragedy, and that he displayed a roll of bills containing \$200 or \$300. She was positive as to his identity. A member of Sullivan's family, in conversation with the Globe correspondent recently, said that by inquiry recently he learned that the man who was at McCann's was named Willis, that he works in St. John, and that the whole affair was a joke put up by a St. John man who keeps a liquor saloon near McCann's boarding-house to have some fun with McCann. Sullivan's counsel says he can prove his client was in Calais on the date claimed by Mrs. McCann that he was in St. John.

The marshal from Calais who arrested Sullivan is in Dorchester, as is also Frogg, who went to the post office there and got letters for Sullivan addressed to John McDonald. The court opened at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
