

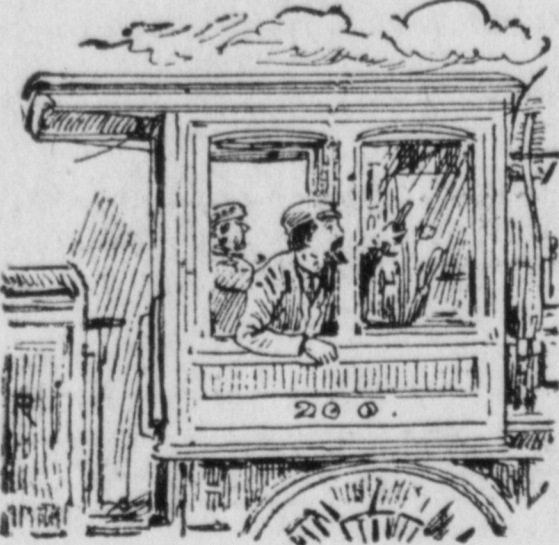

## Unfortunate Cuba.

NEW YORK, Mar. 29.—A Sun special from Havana says: Famine is ravaging the rural districts. The non-combatants who, by orders of General Weyler, have been obliged to gather in the towns, are perishing by hundreds, and in some districts by thousands. As they were obliged to abandon their farms, which had been devastated by the Spanish troops, they have nothing to live on. When they ask permission of the authorities to go some miles from the towns for vegetables the permission is granted, but invariably if they are met in the country by Spanish guerrillas they are murdered and reported afterwards as insurgents killed in battle. When these men try to join the insurgent ranks they are seldom admitted, because the patriots do not want unarmed men. At Artemisa and the near-by villages of Mangas and Cayajubes, province of Pinar del Rio, men and women are dying of hunger in the streets. In the province of Matanzas hundreds of them perish every week. In Santa Clara province the same state of affairs exists, and owing to the general poverty no help can be expected from charity. An engagement is reported from San Augustin. The Spaniards commanded by Major Serra tried to capture a Cuban camp but were repulsed with heavy losses.

## Connolly Committed.

KENTVILLE, March 27.—Melton Connolly was yesterday afternoon committed to trial at the June term to answer to a charge of having murdered Oliver Fuller at Avonport. The evidence hangs on footprints found in the snow when the murder was discovered. Some of these between Connolly's home and Fuller's house have been sworn to as Connolly's. If other prints at the Fuller house are proved to be identical then it looks bad for the prisoner. He was not seen to pass the fatal house while many saw him go there on the day of the murder. The motive for the murder may have been a quarrel. Thirteen pounds of butter were missing from the murdered man's house, and it may have been that Fuller on discovering his loss accused some one of

taking it, who in passion or through fear used the bloody axe. While Connolly awaits trial a sharp look out will be maintained for evidence of guilt in other quarters. Before being sent by he pleaded "not guilty."

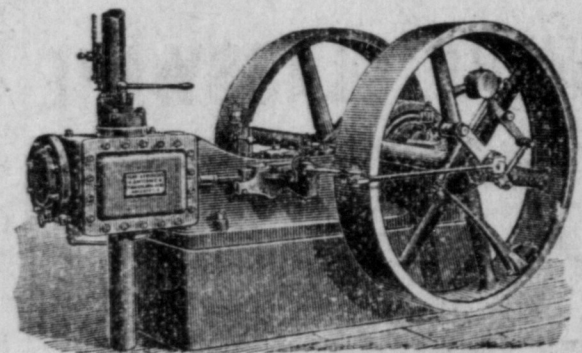
