

POWERS MUST WAIT.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 14.—The Turkish government in its reply to the note of the Ambassadors of the powers offering mediation between Turkey and Greece, says the Sultan will be in a position to discuss mediation after the greater Bairan festival, which began yesterday and ends on Sunday night.

PARIS, May 14.—A despatch from Athens this morning announced that the Greeks have captured Necropolis, the site of the Turkish fortress on the peninsula upon which Prevesa is situated. Eighty Turks, it is added, were killed in the engagement.

ATHENS, May 12.—Advices received today from the headquarters of the Greek army at Domoko announce that the Turkish forces are executing movements which are believed to foreshadow an attack upon the Greek position. It is reported that the Turkish left wing has evacuated Almyro, and is moving towards Pharsala, to the right rear of that place, where, it is further stated, that General Smolentz, commanding the Greek right wing, has re-entered Almyro and has restored telegraphic communication with the Turkish headquarters. Unless the rearward movement of the Turks is the result of the action of the powers, it is believed to indicate that the Turkish commander-in-chief, Edhem Pasha, is again concentrating his troops preparatory to making a general attack upon the main Greek stronghold.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 14.—A most important semi-official announcement was made today. It was, in substance, that in well-informed Russian quarters, evidently the foreign office here, the belief prevails that it will be difficult, if not impossible, to prevent the forces of the Sultan of Turkey from continuing the occupation of Thessaly after peace between Turkey and Greece is concluded. There is a semi-official intimation that Russia may not be opposed to the permanent administration, if not annexation, of Thessaly to the Turkish empire.

Latest War News

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 17.—The Porte has replied officially to the note of the powers and declines to agree to an armistice unless Turkey is allowed to annex Thessaly, the payment by Greece of £10,000,000 (Turkish) and the abolition of the capitulations.

The representatives of the powers held a long meeting and drew up a note which will be presented to the Turkish government as soon as one of the ambassadors receives the necessary instructions from his government. This note does not deal with the peace conditions, but merely repeats the request for an armistice and declares the powers will not permit Greece to be crushed. Although it is assumed in some quarters that the Porte, in accordance with Eastern usage, has demanded more in order to obtain less, it is pointed out that if the Turkish government desired to bargain it would not have formulated its conditions officially. The tone of the military officials here and elsewhere is most emphatically against abandoning Thessaly. They point out that if Europe has been unable to make Greece vacate the Island of Crete, how will Europe be able to force Turkey out of Thessaly?

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 18.—There was a sudden and unexpected change in the political situation shortly before noon today. Russia quietly showed her hand and thereby forced Germany and Turkey out of the game, to all intents and purposes. Last night and early this morning Turkey, supported by Germany, was practically defying Russia, France, Austria Great Britain and Italy, insisting upon the annexation of Thessaly in addition to a huge war indemnity, and to all intents and purposes was determined to march upon Athens. Then came a rumor, late last night, that Bulgaria was preparing to mobilize her forces. This caused alarm at the palace and the feeling of consternation was increased when the Porte received official advices from Sofia this morning announcing that orders had been issued for the partial mobilization of the Bulgarian army. There was a hurried consultation of the ministers. The war party was for further defiance, but in the end pacific counsels seem to have prevailed, for at 11.35 a. m. orders were telegraphed to Edhem Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief in Thessaly, to cease hostilities.

The peace negotiations will now be undertaken in real earnest, and the Greeks will most likely be spared any further humiliation.

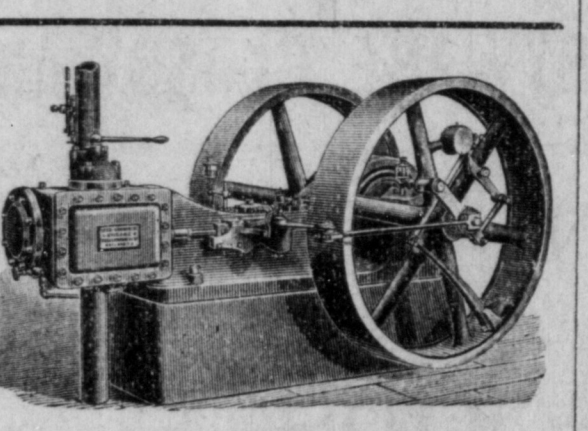
