

## DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, May 13.—The House was opened today by the introduction of Mr. S. F. Perry, Liberal member for West Prince, P. E. I., whose re-entry to Parliament was loudly cheered by his confederates.

Mr. Davies secured a first reading for a bill designed to empower the government to raise dangerous wrecks without being liable for damages to the owners.

Mr. Bergeron, on the orders of the day, referred to Mr. Laurier's defence of Deputy Speaker Brodeur's participation in the Quebec elections by citing his own example, and explained that when he became Deputy Speaker in 1891 he took the office on the distinct understanding that he would be at liberty to take part in elections when the House was not in session.

Mr. Laurier—We made no such bargain with Mr. Brodeur when we offered him the office. (Laughter.)

Mr. Prior asked what regulations had been made governing the item in the tariff providing for the free importation of mining machinery for actual use in mining.

Mr. Paterson replied that he had not yet made any.

Mr. Foster took Mr. Paterson to task for what he termed this unbusinesslike statement. Three weeks had elapsed since the tariff was brought down and, although it became law on the 22nd of April, no regulations had yet been made.

Mr. Fielding intimated that they were in communication with those interested in the mining machinery item, and were contemplating a schedule naming specifically those articles intended to be dutiable and those intended to come in free. The desire was to be definite. From a remark of Mr. Fielding's it was made clear that the consideration of the tariff will not be resumed until next week at least.

On the item for salaries for public health, \$50,000, a discussion lasting three hours took place on the dismissal of two or three quarantine officers, especially Dr. Duncan, the quarantine officer at Victoria, B. C., for the Pacific coast.

Mr. McDougall and Sir Charles Tupper complained of the removal of Dr. Johnson the quarantine officer who boarded vessels at Sydney.

Mr. Fisher explained that Dr. McLeod, of the quarantine hospital, made two officers at that point unnecessary.

In the course of discussion Dr. Borden complained of the dismissal of Caretaker Devlin of the quarantine station at Halifax because there was no investigation.

Mr. Russell explained the circumstances satisfactorily and before he sat down challenged Dr. Borden to discuss the general question of dismissals, but Dr. Borden refrained from accepting the invitation.

When the cold storage item was taken up, Mr. Fisher explained that accommodation is provided in the various shipping and connecting points in Canada with buildings and plant in Halifax, Quebec and other points furnished by the companies, the government guaranteeing five per cent. interest for three years on a certain amount of capital. The capital guaranteed in Halifax was \$40,000. The same was offered in St. John, but no arrangement had been effected in that city. The government would be obliged to provide accommodation at St. John. Storage freight rates in steamships would be at the rate of ten shillings per ton of seventy cubic feet, which was considered to be the bulk of a ton of butter. The government would have to assist the steamships in providing the plant. About twenty-five ships from Montreal would be provided with refrigerators. St. John and Halifax together must depend on the Furness line fortnightly service.

## Goldwin Smith on The Elections.

TORONTO, May 14.—Prof. Goldwin Smith in the 'Weekly Sun' says:—"The landslide in Quebec is even greater than was the landslide in the Dominion. It is nothing less than a total rout of the Conservative party. Something, no doubt, is due to the influence of Mr. Laurier and of his victory in the Dominion. Something, and probably a good deal is due to the reaction against the financial policy and proposals of the local government; but it is impossible to doubt that there is also a revolt against the dominion of the priesthood. Liberalizing influences of various kinds, especially intercourse with New England, from which returning emigrants bring back republican ideas, are doing their work, and are seconded by the growing reluctance of the 'habitants,' depressed as he has been of late, to pay tithes and other ecclesiastical imposts."

## Best Time On Record

QUEENSTON, May 15.—The Cunard Line steamship Lucania, Captain McKay, which left New York on May 8, clearing Sandy Hook lightship at 11.55 a. m., that day arriving here at 7.32 a. m., after a passage of five days, fourteen hours and fifty-four minutes, during which, over the distance steamed, 2,939 knots, she made the best time on record, 21.80 knots per hour, for that distance. During two days steaming the Lucania maintained an average speed of 22.1-3 knots per hour.
