





A NEW HEART TRAP.-Mr. G. W. Robertson received last week from the United States a new heart trap net, the same as those used on the Nova Scotia coast. Its extreme length is about onequarter of a mile including heart and trap. It is about four fathoms deep. It will be set on thecoast here as a mackerel trap. This is but the second trap of the kind that has ever been used on the New Brunswick coast.


