Captured In Montreal.



This evening he disguised himself in woman's clothes, came to the city and drove to the house above mentioned. He admits he planned the robbery but that another man killed the cashier. This, however, is probably untrue.) Kelly is about 21 years of age and does not seem to realize his terrible position. He had \$2400 on his person.



Mrs. Tilton Dead.

NEW YORK, April 17.-Mrs. Elizabeth R. Tilton, the wife of Henry Ward Beecher's accuser, died on Tuesday last at her home in Brooklyn. The news of her death was not made public until to-day. Since the famous Beecher trial she had lived in strict retirement and in recent years had shared her home with her widowed daughter. Even the fact of her death was kept secret and there are no external signs of mourning on the house where the dead body lies. Theodore Tilton, her husband, is in Parss, where he has lived ever since the Beecher trial.

For a long time, Mrs. Tilton was almost totally blind, but less than a year ago she and rwent a difficult operation and re gained her sight. Then, about a month ago, she suffered a paralytic stroke from which she was slowly recovering when in the latter part of last week she was again stricken and succumbed to its effects two days ago. The funeral services were held to-night. Few were admitted to the house. Malachi Taylor, a preacher of the Plymouth brethren, to which sect Mrs. Tilton belonged, officiated. The interment will take place tomorrow.



Water in the Red River at Winnipeg continues to rise gradually. Merchants have moved all goods out of the basements and all precautions are being taken. Affairs at Emerson are in a bad shape. The town is under several feet of water. The water undermined the foundations of many houses and a hurricane on Sunday played havoc with the buildings, wrecking several residences and warehouses. The Massey-Harris and McCaul warehouses were among the wrecked buildings. All the churches of the town are under water and no services could be held Sunday: The Northern Pacific Railway bridge at Saint Norbert, a few miles from Winnipeg, has been washed away and the Northern Pacific track is under several feet of water. A rise of a few more feet at Winenipeg will reach the power houses and cut off the city lighting.




