

Money In Frogs.


Though there may be no frog farms in Maine, there was at least one Maine man who got rich by selling frogs' legs to Boston and New York hotels, says the New York Sun. His name was Weld, and he lived in the town of Greenbush, on the east bank of the Penobscot River, some twenty five miles north of Bangor. Though a blacksmith and an axemaker by trade, he made his fortune out of frogs. His custom was to provide the boys in his neighborhood with small dip nets and send them out to the bogs and swamps of Greenbush, Milford, Greenfield and Olamon. For graybellies and greenbellies he paid the boys five cents a dozen, and when they brought in a dozen of golden throated bullfrogs, he gave them a cent for every frog. In this way he paid out money to the boys and made money for himself for about twenty years and when he died, about 1880, his estate was appraised at \$112,000. After the death of Weld, his nephews and nieces proceeded to divide the property; and as they were well off and did not need to work, the frog-catching industry was abandoned -Fishing Gazette.
