LADY'S TALK

Commented on by American Press.

New York, June 16.—Commenting on Hon. W. Laurier's utterances in Great Britain and the eventuality of a "Free Trading British Empire," the Evening Post (Free Trade) says: "In spite of the enormous advantages of our domestic market, the American farmer will find that his Canadian rival is in many respects better off. Canadian grain can be carried to the markets of the world quite as cheaply as American grain, and will, therefore, sell for as much money. But that money will now be spent for goods that are moderately taxed instead of paying 50 or 100 per cent., as in our country, and the difference in the results will soon be perceptible. Canada will suffer from the customs wall that is to be built up on our frontiers; perhaps she will suffer more than we. But she will gain from freer access to the markets of the world, while we are laboring to make such access difficult."

TALK VERSUS ACTION.

The Tribune (Republican) says: "A urious effort is being made to bolster up the declining cause of Cobdenism. When Laurier, the Canadian Prime Minister, whom the Cobdenites had fondly reckoned as one of themselves, came out as a protectionist and advocate of an Imperial customs union, they were roused to the energy of despair. Hence the frantic efforts they are making to conceal or to distort the facts even to the extent of trying to get Laurier to repudiate his own words and acts. Mr. Laurier talked well of free trade before the Canadian election, and he talks well of it now, but the concrete fact is that he has fastened the protection system upon Canada more firmly than ever before. He has done so because he could not do otherwise. It was an absolute necessity of practical politics and of practical economics. He is not to be censured but rather congratulated upon it."

"Mr Laurier is represented as saying that the Canadian tariff discrimination in favor of Great Britain is not a step toward nor approval of the Imperial Customs Union scheme. It was not adopted on the principle of give and take. It was the free gift to the Mother Country, for which no return is asked or expected. These are noble sentiments. But they do not conceal the fact that it was Great Britain alone that the gift was made. It was not made to other countries. On the contrary, the 'tariff wall,' as the Cobdenites call it, was built all the higher against

them. So, despite all protestations, the free gift was a step, not toward Cobdenism, but toward a customs union: not toward free trade, but toward protection. It means free trade within the British Empire, just as protection means free trade within the United States. But it means protection against all outside the Empire, just as the American system means protection against all outside of the United States. In that radical respect it is the antithesis of Cobdenism, the cardinal principle of which is that there shall be no distinction between the Fatherland and alien lands in matters of trade and taxation. Mr. Laurier, of course, recognizes that fact, and is doubtless surprised and disgusted at the grotesque attempt that is being made to make it appear otherwise."

"FAVORED NATION" ASPECT.

The Sun (Protectionist) says: "The recent attempt of the Parliament at Ottawa to discriminate in favor of goods imported from Great Britain into the Dominion of Canada was applauded at Liverpool on Saturday by the Duke of Devonshire. For the present, of course, the proposed discrimination is inoperative (sic), and it must remain so until the treaties between Great Britain and Belgium and the German Empire, which expressly forbid such legislation, have been abrogated. "Probably we are justified, however, in inferring from the position taken by the influential member of the Salisbury Government that due notice will be given to Belgium and Germany of an intention to terminate those treaties. There is reason to believe that such a policy will be resisted strenuously by the Gladstonian party, and that it will prove distasteful to the British community at large when the economical effects of it shall have been made clear."

"On both general and specific grounds Lord Ripon opposed the plan proposed at the Ottawa Conference two years ago, and arrived at the conclusion that to adopt it would be detrimental not only to the Mother Country but also to the colonies themselves. It seems questionable whether even the Salisbury Government will consent to denounce the Belgian and German treaties. If they do not, the Canadian tariff legislation on imports from Great Britain is not worth a straw."
