On Monday an evening service was held in the Sunday school at which addresses were delivered by Canon Forsyth and Rev. Mr. Snow on Sunday school work. Tuesday morning communion service was held in the parish church and in the afternoon an association meeting was held at which Rev. DEATH OF MR. LANIGAN.—Mr. Daniel Lanigan, one of the oldest and most respected residents of this section, died at the home of his son, Mr. Keady Lanigan, Kingston on Sunday morning. Mr. Lanigan was born in Tipperary, Ireland, 94 years ago and came to this province when quite a young man. He has resided in various parts of the province, Miramichi, Kouchibouguac, Buctouche and Kingston. He married a Miss O'Leary, sister of Mr. Keady O'Leary, and Henry O'Leary of this town. Mrs. Lanigan died some 30 years ago. He leaves five sons, Patrick, of Calais, Me; and Martin and Keady, of Kingston; James, of Brandon, Man.; and Arthur, who follows the sea; and one daughter, Mrs. David McAlmon, Kingston. The interment was made in the Kingston R. C. Cemetery on Tuesday morning. The funeral was very largely attended. High mass was celebrated by Rev. E. J. Bannon. The pallbearers were: Messrs. David Palmer, Henry Hickey, Martin Flanagan, John McInerney, Thos. Burns and Keady O'Leary, Sr.

TWENTY-ONE YEARS AWAY FROM HOME.—Thomas Dennis, son of Mr. John Dennis of Middle Stewiacke, who has been companion to the great iron king, Herr Krupp, of Germany, for the last twenty-one years, is expected home in a week or so for the first time during that time. He is a brother of William Dennis of the Halifax Herald and A. Dennis of the New Glasgow "Leader" and "Enterprise." In reference to this immensely rich man with whom Mr. Dennis has been employed for over twenty years, an exchange has the following: "From the same source comes a personal description of Herr Krupp, the great iron master, whose cannons are his loud mouthed advertisement. With the possible exception of the Kaiser, he is by far no richest man in Germany, his wealth being estimated a hundred million dollars. He is probably the largest single employer of labor in the world, having more than thirty thousand people working for him. With all his money and influence he is absolutely modest and unassuming. He has refused all offers of titles, and dresses almost as plainly as the Russian Sage. Once when he had bought a pair of gold sleeve buttons, he had them washed over with silver to make them less conspicuous. He gives away millions of marks every year in charity."—Truth News.

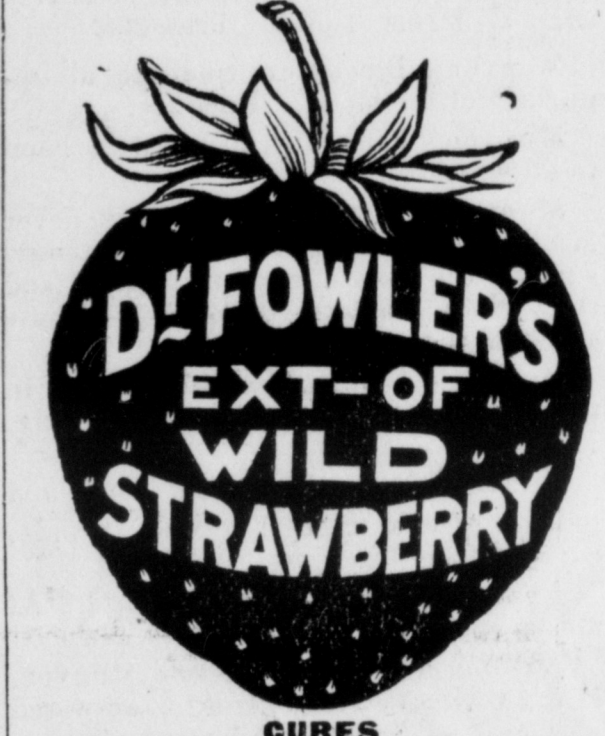

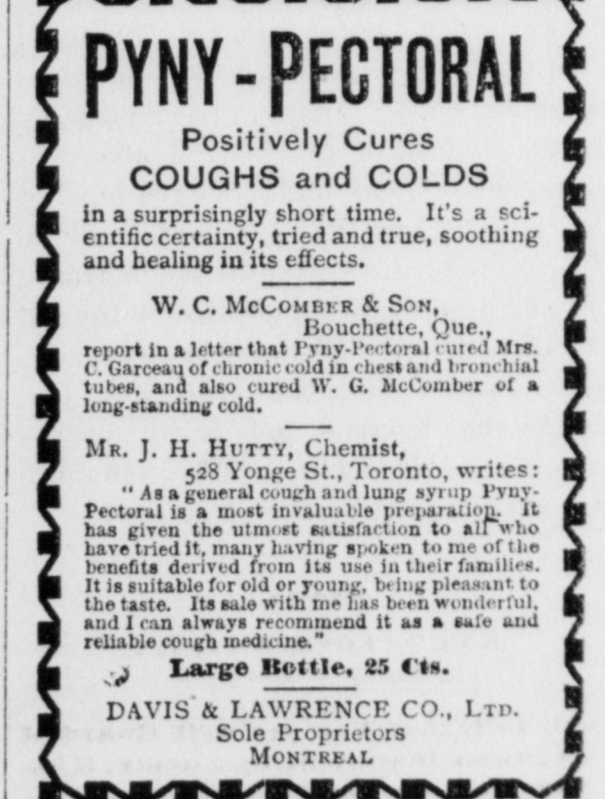

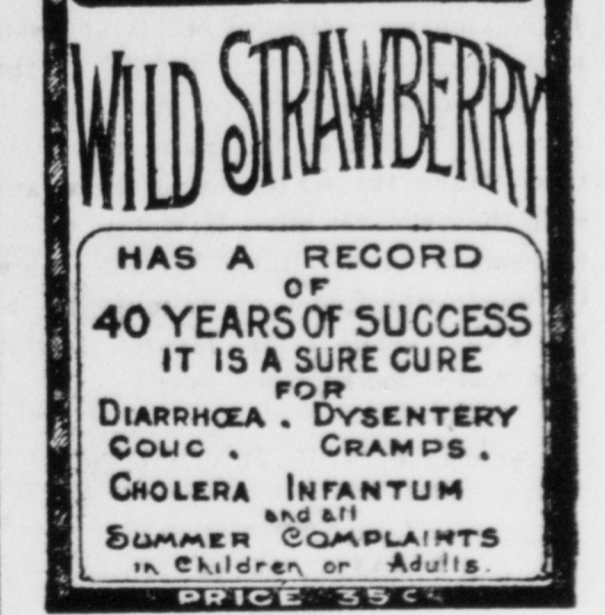
