BOILED TO DEATH.—A few days ago the four-year-old child of Gilbert Cormier of Cocagne, met with a frightful death. Sitting on the floor of the kitchen the little one overturned on itself a pot of boiling lye, which had just been taken off the stove. The contents drenched the little one from head to foot. On removing the clothing the skin and flesh peeled off. Dr. Chandler was called but could do nothing for the sufferer. It died after two hours agony.—Times.

CALL TO REV. F. W. MURRAY, OF BASS RIVER.—At the meeting of the Presbytery of St. John held in St. John last week a call from the congregation of Saint James church, Milltown, Charlotte county, was presented in favor of Rev. F. W. Murray of Bass River. The call was a unanimous one signed by sixty members and ninety-four adherents, with a guaranteed salary of \$800 per annum. It was agreed to sustain the call and forward it to the Miramichi Presbytery for presentation to Rev. Mr. Murray. Rev. Dr. McKay, of Chatham, was appointed commissioner to support the call.

GODDARD-BOURQUE.—St. Bernard's church was the scene of an interesting event yesterday morning, when Mr. H. S. Goddard, of Elgin, was married to Miss Mary E. Bourque, eldest daughter of Mr. Cammies Bourque of Moncton. The ceremony was performed at 11 o'clock by Rev. Father LeBlanc. The bride was attended by Miss Goddard, sister of the groom, while the groom was ably supported by Mr. Jos. Bourque, brother of the bride. Mr. Goddard has been teaching school at Buctouche. The bride has also been engaged in teaching at the same place until recently.

DEATH OF CAPT. McLAUGHLIN.—Capt. Richard McLaughlin died of paralysis at the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. Patrick Connaughton, on Friday morning 9th, inst., at 10.30 o'clock. Deceased was stricken with paralysis about four years ago on board the bark Unity, while on a voyage from Bahia Blanca to Queenstown. He has since had two attacks, the last resulting in his death. Captain McLaughlin was born in Kingston 61 years ago, and was the son of the late James McLaughlin. He married Miss Lizzie Connaughton about 15 years ago, who with one daughter Miss Francis, survive him. The funeral took place from his late residence on Monday, and was largely attended, the interment being made in the R. C. Cemetery, Kingston. High Mass was celebrated in St. Aloysius Church, by Rev. E. J. Bannon.

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PICKETT-ORR.—St. John's church, Kingston, was the scene of a very happy event yesterday morning, when Mr. H. H. Pickett, barrister, of St. John, was united in marriage to Miss Grace L. Orr, of Jardineville. There was a large number of spectators present. —Two Indians were convicted by stipendiary Davis on Monday for being drunk and disorderly at Big Cove on Sunday. They told the court where they got their liquor—from a dealer in Kingston.

—Sarah Bourque, a seven year old child, was killed on the I. C. R. near Shediac Friday evening. The little girl was driving a cow across the track when the accident occurred. A coroner's jury exonerated the train officials.

—The annual picnic for the benefit of the new R. C. Church, will be held at St. Ann, Kent Co., on Wednesday and Thursday twenty-first and twenty-second inst. This promises to be one of the grandest affairs of the kind of the season.

—A 65 h. p. boiler and a smoke-stack arrived over the K. N. Railway on Friday for Mr. E. Walker's mill in Bass River. They were loaded on a scow on Saturday and taken up river. The boiler was manufactured by Waring, White & Co., St. John.

—It has been reported that a quantity of smuggled liquor was landed at Kingston last week. The customs officials have spared no efforts to locate the "stuff" but as they have been unsuccessful, it may fairly be assumed that the report was untrue.

—At the funeral of the late Capt. McLaughlin on Monday, quite a commotion was made by horses becoming frightened at the train which was running down on the R. R. wharf while the funeral was coming up Queen St. A carriage belonging to Mr. J. M. O'Brien, was almost totally demolished, and other vehicles injured. No one was hurt, however.

There was a serious stabbing affray on Queen St. late Saturday night, a well known young man being the victim. The perpetrator, a youth of eighteen was intoxicated when the deed was done. He was sent to jail under a warrant issued by Justice Cais to stand the preliminary examination on Monday. The prosecutor decided not to appear against the prisoner if he would promise to leave town upon being released. The expenses were paid by a friend of the prisoner who left town straightaway.

—Andrew Hinchey, aged 28, of Parker's Ridge, was drowned at Portage Bank, on the S. W. Miramichi last Thursday. He left Parker's Ridge with his brother James and four other young men for a picnic at Boistown. On their way they stopped at the place named to have a swim. Three of the young men, including the two Hinchey's, mounted their horses to swim them down a deep pool. James was first thrown off and, not being able to swim, was rescued with great difficulty, and while his rescue was being effected, Andrew was thrown off his horse unnoticed and sank to the bottom.

—On account of Tuesday evening being wet and threatening, the lawn social advertised to take place on the rectory grounds, had to be held in the temperance hall. There were well spread tables containing all the dainties of the season. Vocal and instrumental music was furnished and a very enjoyable time was spent. Solos were sung by Mr. A. C. Storer, Miss Sylvia Black, Miss Hazel Hudson, and little Louisa and Ruth Meek sang a duet. The handsome sum of \$60 was realized. The ladies in charge of the affair desire to tender their thanks to the public for liberal patronage.

—Supervisor John Irving has received a road making machine, which has been supplied by the local government. It has been procured by Mr. Barnes, M. P. P. who is interesting himself in behalf of the roads throughout the county. This machine should prove a boon to the people of this part of Kent, and they ought to spare no efforts to keep it employed. Where there are so many men and teams there can be no excuse for bad roads hereafter. Mr. Barnes has also procured a machine for Buctouche. They are American make having been manufactured by F. C.
