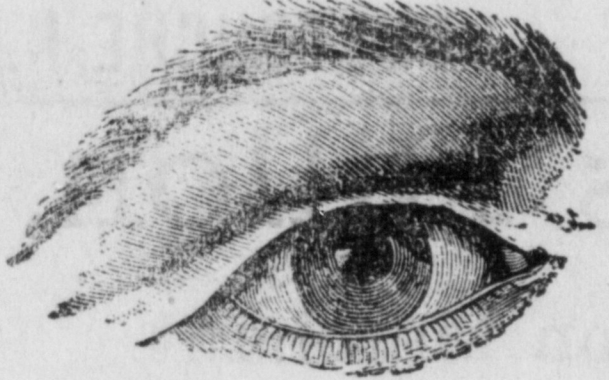

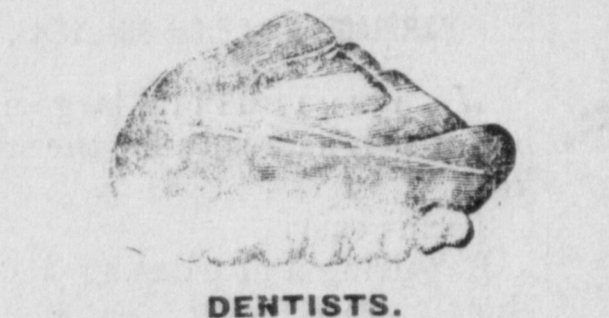

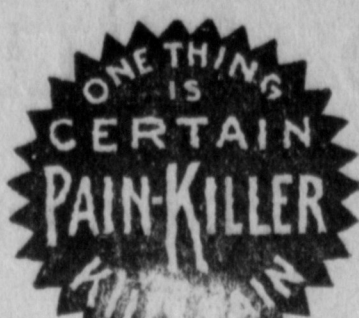

John R. Wilson's Death. The following letter was recently received by Mr. Wilson, Kingston, furnishing particulars of his son's death:

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 16, 1897. Mr. Peter Wilson, Kingston, N. B.

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of a letter from Frank Wilson, of Victoria, B. C. and complying with his request I now will so give you what information I can about the death of your son, John R. Wilson. Your son worked for us on bridges on the Columbia and Red Mtn. Ry. from the last of October until he took sick in Dec. On Dec. 23rd he did not feel well enough to go out, but stayed in camp, thinking it was only a cold and would leave him in a few days. We were then camped in Rossland and after a few days he consulted Dr. Bowes, who gave him some medicine and he returned to camp, but not well enough to go to work.

We finished our contract and broke up camp on Dec. 28th, and he stopped at Rossland until Jan. 4th, when he went to the hospital at Trail. I reached Trail on Tuesday, Jan. 5th, and soon learned of his serious illness. I went to see him Wednesday morning about 11 o'clock, and he was too delirious to answer any of my questions. I asked him if he had any friends near that he would like to see, but poor fellow, his mind wandered off, and the Dr. asked me not to stay too long as he was too weak and delirious to answer any questions. When I entered the room he knew me and shook hands with me but could not make any intelligent reply to my questions. That afternoon about 4 o'clock he died of pneumonia and I will say that to my best knowledge and belief he was well cared for, and the doctor left nothing undone, trying to save him. The funeral took place on Saturday, and I enclose herewith a piece I cut out of the Trail newspaper.

The funeral of John R. Wilson, who died this week of pneumonia, will take place Saturday afternoon. Mr. Wilson was last year governor of the Bay Avenue Wedge and was lately employed on the Red Mountain Road. He is about 38 years of age, unmarried and a native of Kingston, N. B. He has a brother residing at Vancouver. Services will be conducted by Rev. Mr. McMillan, with interment in the cemetery on Smelter Hill.

The Healthfulness of Sewage Farm Products

Concerning the question of the healthfulness of crops grown on sewage disposal farms, the Hospital speaks as follows:

"This is a question which cannot be settled with a precision approaching to the mathematical, either in physiological laboratories or by means of statistics gathered from the experience of the community at large. But there is an old scientific method, now a good deal despised, whereby men of intelligence can arrive at trustworthy conclusions; and that is the method of careful observation, personal experiment, and an appeal to the court of common sense. By the use of this method many facts like the following have been accumulated by generations of experimentalists, and they settle the controversy in a practical sense. For example, if a cow is fed on turnips, within twenty-four hours her milk will taste of turnips, and if butter be churned from the cream, the butter will taste too. The intensity of the turnip flavor is the measure of the quantity of turnips taken. In like manner, if pigs be fed on horseflesh, as they often are, their bacon will taste of the horseflesh; if they be fed on fish, the bacon has a fishy taste. The same is true of hens and their eggs. Feed hens on decaying animal matter, which they will eat greedily, and both their eggs and flesh will be most unpleasant and unwholesome eating. In the case of ducks the facts are much more striking. Ducks are very unclean feeders. Give them abundance of garbage, and they will refuse corn and similar food. Their flesh is then most pungent to the taste, and in many people is so potent poisoning as to produce diarrhoea. Animals fed on sewage farms under certain conditions are liable to have their flesh and secretions changed in character by the sewage-produced herbs and grasses upon which they feed. If the sewage on a given farm be so managed that no more of it be put into the soil than any given crop can adequately deal with, then the crop will be sweet and natural, and the cattle or other animals fed on it will be sweet and natural too. But if the soil be gorged to repletion with sewage, then the crops will be surcharged with sewage elements, and unfit for food, and the meat and milk of animals fed on such crops will be like the crops, and very unpleasant to the taste as well as dangerous to health. It is in the last resort all a question of the intelligence and conscience of the managers of sewage farms."
