PAPER MONEY.

The Kinds of Currency That Are Used by Foreign Countries.

The Bank of England note is 5 inches by 8 in dimensions and is printed in black ink on Irish linen water lined paper, plain white, with ragged edges.

The German currency is rather artistic. The bills are printed in green and black. They run in denominations from 5 to 1,000 marks.

The Chinese paper currency is in red, white and yellow, with gilt lettering and gorgeous little hand drawn devices.

The 100 ruble note of Russia is barred from top to bottom with all the colors of the rainbow, blended as when shown through a prism.
