ALMOST DROWNED.-A Main River correspondent writes: Miss Helen Lawson, of Main River was almost drowned last Wednesday. She and four other young ladies went np river for the purpose of picking gooseberries. The day being very hot Miss Lawson and Miss Fearon waded out a short distance into the river, Miss Lawson getting beyond her depth, sank to the bottom. Miss Fearon hurried to her rescue, but she, too sank to the hottom. Mr. D. D. Mc-Eachran, lumber surveyor, who was working a short distance away, ran to their assistance. Plunging into the river Mr. McEachran succeeded in rescuing both young ladies. When rescued Miss Lawson showed no signs of life and it was with much difficulty that she was resusitated. Much praise is due Mr. McEachran for his bravery.


