THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD.

Fred Webb the bigamist who was arrested in Cocagne by Detective Wright assisted by Constables MacDongall and Thomas has been tried before Judge Johnson at Halifax under the Speedy Trial act and was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. He and a man named Pace sentenced to two years for stabbing, were taken to Dorchester Thursday.

Hugh John Macdonald has accepted the leadership of the opposition in the Manitoba Legislature.

A private letter from Dr. Allingham, the London surgeon who operated on Lieut. Governor Kirkpatrick, of Ontario, expresses the belief that the patient's life cannot long be saved.

A clerk in the department of the Secretary of State at Ottawa, who has been taking money that did not belong to him, has at the invitation of Hon. Mr. Scott, who refused to prosecute, handed in his resignation.

The Senate remained in secret session Wednesday afternoon for three hours and a half, during which time it disposed of all important amendments to the general treaty of arbitration and failed utterly to agree as to a time when the final vote shall be taken. Mr. Perkins re-introduced his old bill to amend the naturalization laws. It provides for the usual five years' period and requires that each alien seeking to be naturalized must speak the English language, the provision that he must be able to read and write having been stricken out. The applicant must show himself acquainted with the principles of the constitution and to have an understanding of the system of government of the United States and of the states thereof.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries has made a position for Hon. Peter Mitchell as an advisor to the department. He was the Minister thirty years ago, when it was first organized. A Canadian exchange in speaking of his work while Minister, says: "Mr. Mitchell understands the maritime and fishing interests of Canada. As the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Conservative Government formed immediately after Confederation, he organized the department and no minister of that day more faithfully and conscientiously labored to have that organization 'effective.' It was during this first administration, too, that it became necessary to protect our fisheries. Though the United States had abrogated the Washington treaty in 1866, the young Dominion found the Yankee fishermen boldly continuing to exercise the privileges their government had renounced. Mr. Mitchell organized a fleet of cruisers, and these, which were at first rather ridiculed and called 'Peter Mitchell's pirates,' proved decidedly 'effective.' Vessel after vessel, fishing inside the three-mile limit was seized and confiscated, and the determination shown even thus early in the history of Confederation to protect our rights and its effects. Diplomatic correspondence followed and Mr. Mitchell's dispatches were models. It all led to the Washington treaty and the Halifax Commission, under which \$5,500,000 had to be paid by the United States."—Fishing Gazette.

To Blockade Crete

CANEA, March 31.—The insurgents by a bold stroke occupied the hill on the south side of Sudac Bay last evening. They were promptly shelled by the British, Austria and Russian warships. At daybreak to-day the firing was resumed and the Cretans driven from their positions.

BERLIN, March 31.—The blockade of Greece has been decided upon with the consent of all the powers and will be enforced at an early date.

Opposition in Caucus.

OTTAWA, March 31.—The first Conservative caucus of the session was held this morning in the Railway Committee room. Mr. W. H. Bennett, the young member from East Simcoe, presided, and Sir Charles Tupper, Messrs. Haggart, Tisdale, Montague, McLennan and other leaders were present, and nearly all the members of the Opposition. Mr. Poupore, member for Pontiac, did not attend. Sir Charles Tupper addressed the gathering on the sessional programme and the necessity of organization. The caucus decided to resist any consideration of the franchise bill until after the tariff bill had been brought down. This is a determination to obstruct, and may lead to some lively scenes in the House. The Opposition believe they have a whip to hold over the Premier's head, that if they do not have their way they will make it impossible for the Premier to attend Her Majesty's Jubilee celebration in England, in June.

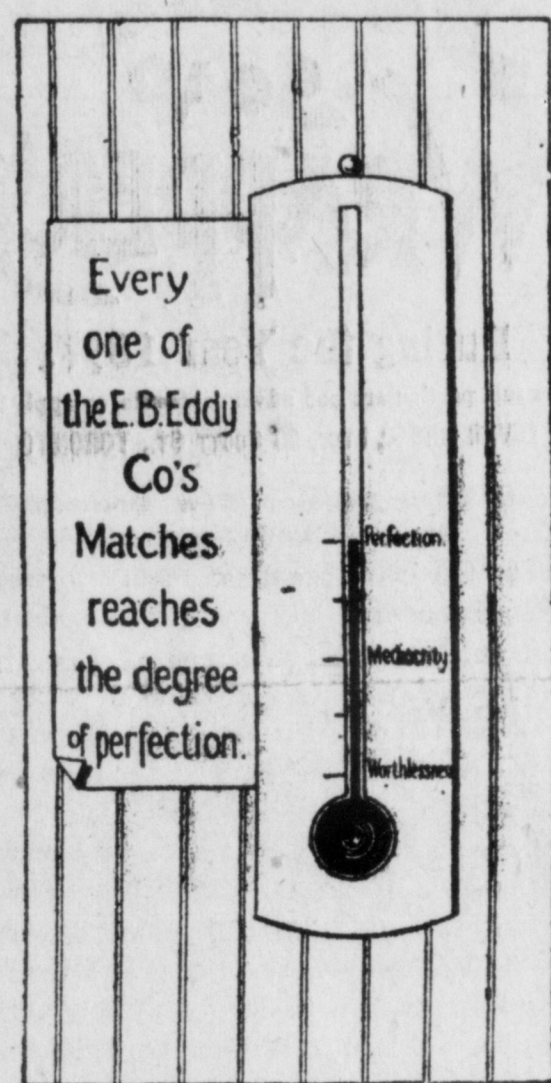
