(Continued from page 2.) Dr. Macdonald-Do you mean to say

that I ever advocated free coal oil? Mr. McInerney said that according to the Hansard of 1891 the hon. gentleman denounced the coal oil duty as an abomination of iniquities. The hon, gentleman used to be an out-and-out free trader, but if he had now seen light the protectionists would be glad to welcome him to their ranks. With respect to the franchise bill, Mr. McIngrney proclaimed himself in favour of a system of residential manhood suffrage rather than the Grit patchwork system which the Government wanted to force upon the country. Taking up the school question, Mr. McInern w pointed out that the reading in the Mouse of a statement from the London Tablet forced Mr. Tarte to admit that a communication had gone from members of the Government to Rome, and caused the Minister to read the petition that had been sent. It should be borne in mind, the speaker said, that the Tablet was the organ of the English Catholics, and was supposed to reflect the views of Cardinal Vaughan. At the time Mr. Fitzpatrick was in England, the Tablet advised an acceptance of the settlement. It was all the more significant therefore, and came with additional force, that recently the Tablet had déclared Mr. Laurier must carry out the pledges of himself and followers or meet the opposition of the hierarchy and the great body of Liberals in Quebec. The House had been led to understand by Mr. Fitzpatrick that a few Roman Catholics only had laid their grievance before the pope. What were the facts? In the petition read by Mr. Tarte, the statement was made that the petitioners represented the Liberal party On the previous night the speaker had stated that other documents, charges, or petitions than that read had been sent to Rome. This statement was not flatly contradicted by Mr. Tarte, but the latter left the inference that this petition was the only document sent, yet the petition contained the statement :- "Your Holiness has already been made aware of the conduct and attitude of certain parties." Does this not prove that other communications had passed between the Liberals and the Vatican? (Opposition cheers.) As a matter of fact, Mr. McInerney understood, on very good authority, that complaints had been forwarded to Rome against several of the priests in Quebec. Proceeding, Mr. McInerney said :- "I charge the Minister of Public Works with having already stated in this House that unless justice was granted and the privileges guaranteed by the constitution were obtained for the minority in this country they would annex themselves to the United States."

Mr. Tarte here rose, with considerable heat, and said :- "My hon. friend is altogether wrong. I never made such statement in the House or out of it."

Mr. McInerney-I would like to accept the statement. I suppose I am forced to accept it, if a gentleman occupying so high and honourable a position makes it, but in vindication of the charge I made let me read a statement made by the hon. gentleman on the 6th of March, 1893, in the House, as reported in the Hansard. He was referring to the guarantees under the constitution, and to the great patience that had been shown by the French people under the wrongs that had been inflicted upon them, and he added :- "It must not be thought that these evidences of patience and of tolerance are always and in every case to come from the same side. On this continent of America it will be well never to forget there is large space where we could find protection, and where | Kent Co. our rights would not be assailed."

Mr. Tarte, who laughed immoderately while the extract was being read, here enquired: "Is that all?"

A Voice—Is that not enough? Mr. McInerney said the language he

had quoted contained a threat by Mr. Tarte that unless justice were done to his compatriots in this country and in Manitoba h. was prepared to lead his people in a rebellion against the constituted authorities in Canada. (Opposition cheerand counter cheers.) Mr. McInerney then discussed at some length the pledge bishop of Quebec, and argued that the facts showed that the Solicitor-General in giving this pledge was actuated not by motives of high political morality, but a desire to secure political support. Mr. Fitzpatrick thought to absolve himself from his pledge by quoting some extracts from Justin McCarthy on the greatness and power of the Pope. Proceeding to speak upon the pledge given to the bishops by the member for Gaspe, the speaker was interrupted by Mr. Lemieux, who cose and said he had never signed any pledge. Mr. Lemieux added that a pledge was offered to himself and Mr. Ennis, the Conservative candidate, to sign, but while the first clause desired the candidates to luck. support remedial legislation for the minority, another clause repudiated Sir Charles by practicing on a dog. Tupper, on the ground that at Winnipeg he had attacked the French nationality. On this account the Conservative candidate, as well as Mr. Lemieux himself, refused to append their signatures to the pledge. 'Mr. McInerney concluded a clever speech with an eloquent peroration, in which he predicted that the country would speedily tire of men who made

such reckless promises in order to obtai

office. The spectacle would be repeated in Canada that had been witnessed on the other side, where a great party that had proved false to its platform and recreant to its trust was ignominiously hurled

Mr. Maclean repudiated responsibility fer any action on the part of the Conservative party which might be construed into a desire to reintroduce legislation to coerce Manitoba. He likewise desired to be free from the responsibility for any action which might make it appear that the Conservative party did not sympathize with the desire of the Quebec people to maintain their civil liberties. So far as the Conservatives of Ontario were concerned, the school question was a dead issue. The Government and the Liberal party must take full responsibility for the mission to Rome. If the liberties of British subjects were to be conserved, Rome was not the place to go to. That question had to be settled within the walls f this Parliament. Mr. Maclean recalled the resolutions passed at the Liberal convention in Ottawa, and reminded the House that the present Premier and three of his colleagues were pledged to redistri bution and increase of provincial subsidies






