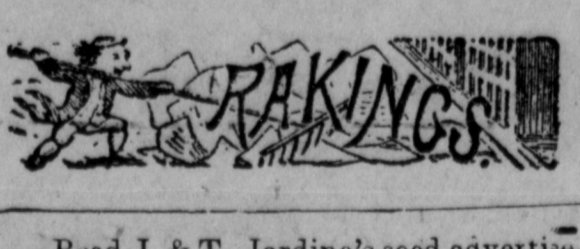

—Premier Laurier will, it is announced, leave for England on June 3rd. All his arrangements for the trip are about completed.

—The Scott Act fines collected in Westmorland County during the month of April amounted to \$1,035. The largest on record.

—A large number of Micmacs from Big Cove left last week for Point Escuminac where they will engage in lobster fishing.

—Last week the Moncton Board of Health ordered all the schools and churches in the city closed on account of the prevalence of diphtheria.

—The Joseph Grogan scow which was sold Saturday by Mr. H. O'Leary, was bid in by Mr. O'Leary himself for \$220,00. Mr. W. H. McLeod afterwards bought the scow from Mr. O'Leary.

—The young people of Bass and Molus River will hold a "basket social" in the Hall at Bass River on Tuesday evening, May 11th. Doors will be open at 7.30. Old and young cordially welcomed.

—A large number of small lobsters, from 2 to 3 inches long, are reported strewn along the beaches. The protracted easterly wind has no doubt been the cause of them being washed ashore.

—Hon. Messrs Tweedie and Dunn had a conference with Dr. Frink on Saturday regarding tuberculosis in cattle. It is understood the government will take immediate steps for an inspection of all milk cattle. The co-operation of the Dominion government will be sought.

—Bathurst people say that a Mrs. Fred Bourdepay, living with her husband and eight children at Blue Cove, Gloucester county, has not eaten anything for over 60 days, as a result of illness. She is reduced to a skeleton, but has not had any medical attendance.

—Mr. A. T. LeBlanc has a crew of men working at the Richardson house which he is repairing for a hotel. The rooms have been enlarged, a large ell is being built and the roof of the main building will be raised and given a greater pitch. When completed, this will be one of the finest houses in town.

—Mr. Hoar, inspector of bridges for the local government is in Kingson looking after the building of a new bridge at Mill Creek. The old bridge will be torn down at once and a new one begun as soon as possible. While the bridge is under construction teams will have to cross the creek near its head.

—For the last ten days strong north east wind has prevailed and a good deal of rain has fallen. The rain has no doubt done good as all the lumber is likely to be got out of the streams, but the wind has prevented fishermen from getting anything done in their line. Herring are said to be very plentiful, but no one can catch them.

—Dr. Murray McLaren, of St. John, who came here on Monday to make a medical examination in the case of Mrs. R. Phinney, decided that that lady was suffering from an abscess and an operation was necessary for her recovery. He took her to St. John Tuesday, where she will be placed in a hospital and the operation performed.

—Mr. James Curwin, had a narrow escape from drowning one day last week. He with a companion went out on a cake of ice, to launch a boat belonging to Mr. Wm. Hudson. When Mr. Curwin started to come ashore he discovered that the ice had left the shore. There was nothing for him to do but swim. He lost his boots—a pair of rubber ones—and succeeded with the utmost difficulty in reaching the shore.

—Mrs. James Conway died at her home the Royal Hotel, Kingston, on Tuesday morning, after a severe illness of over three weeks duration. She had a complication of diseases, inflammation of the kidneys being the principal cause of her death. Mrs. Conway was a Miss Lyons, of Miramichi. She leaves besides her husband, one daughter and three sons all of whom are grown up. The remains were taken on Wednesday to Chatham for interment. 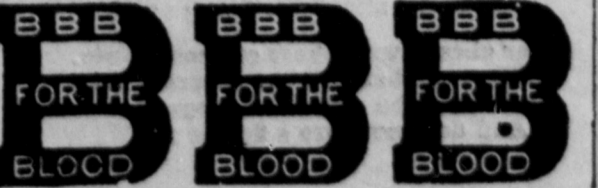
