

Many Lives Lost.

NEW YORK, May 1.—A special from Kingston, Ja., says there has been a succession of terrific earthquake shocks in the Leeward Islands, killing many people and doing great damage to property. The centre of the disturbance is at Montserrat, but the area affected extends from St. Kitts to Martinique. The greatest loss of life is at Guadeloupe. All business has been suspended and the churches have been opened for general prayer.

LIMA, Peru, May 1.—A violent disturbance, lasting about one minute, caused great alarm here at 9 o'clock this morning. All the church bells were tolled to call the faithful to prayer, as a serious disaster was apprehended. The shocks were also felt in the suburbs of this city. No loss of life or serious damage has yet been reported.

Condemned to death.

BARCELONA, May 1.—Twenty-six anarchists in addition to those already sentenced have been condemned to death for complicity in the bomb outrages of June 7th last, feast of Corpus Christi, when a dynamite bomb was thrown into the midst of a procession which was on its way to the church of Santa Maria Del Mar, killing a dozen persons outright and wounding about fifty others, some of whom have since died from the injuries received upon that occasion.

A Brutal Outrage.

SISTERVILLE, W. Va., May 1.—Last night Mrs. Shock, an aged woman living at Adonis, was horribly tortured and robbed by a negro and a white man who forced an entrance into her house. The robbers brutally beat her bare feet with switches, burned them to a crisp with candles and also burned the hair from her head and roasted one ear. The woman finally told where her money was hidden and the robbers secured \$500 and escaped. The woman will probably die.

Wife Murderer's Sentence.

TORONTO, May 1. Sam Rowatt, who shot and killed his wife and was yesterday convicted of manslaughter, was sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary this morning.

The Queen and Her Jubilee.

LONDON, May 1.—The arrival and departure of the Queen to and from London in jubilee week will be a matter of semi-state. On Monday, June 21, the journey from Paddington Station to Buckingham Palace will be imposing, and on June 24 the procession from the palace to Paddington station, on the return to Windsor, will be the occasion for even a finer display. The Indian and colonial troops will form the escort on the latter occasion.

The Queen will hold a special court on June 23, the day after the ceremony at St. Paul's Cathedral at Buckingham Palace.

She will then receive the representatives of the foreign powers, the colonies and the special envoys.

Hon. Clifford Sifton, Minister of Interior, will on Friday receive a Winnipeg deputation which will urge the building of the locks at St. Andrews Rapids, and thus making the Red River navigable for steamboats. Friday evening Mr. Sifton leaves for Ottawa.

England has several grand old women who were born before Victoria, and carry their years well. Mrs. Gladstone is six months older than the Queen, the Baroness Burdett Coutts is five years older, and Lady Louisa Tighe, who was present at the ball on the eve of Waterloo, and is still hale and lively, was a girl of 15 when Victoria was born.

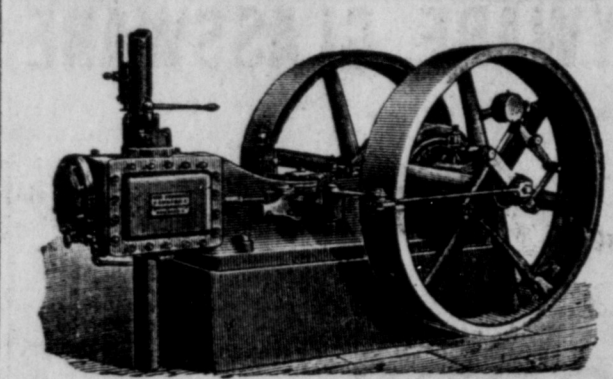
