COUNTY COURT.—The April term of the Kent County court opened on Tuesday at 4 o'clock p. m. Judge Wells presiding. The following petit jurors were in attendance:—Alex. S. Girvan, Simon Daigle, Hydolphe Barribeau, David Palmer, Roderick McDonald, Eusebe Commeau, Honore Landry, Donally McDermott, Wm. E. Forbes, Moise Barribeau, Robt. Beers and Alex. Lennox. As there was neither criminal nor civil business to transact the court was immediately adjourned.

A PILOT'S DEATH.—Mr. John McEachran, pilot, son of Angus McEachran, who is the oldest pilot of the port of Miramichi, died on Sunday last, of consumption. He leaves a widow and four sons. The funeral, which took place on Tuesday afternoon from his late residence, Water Street, Chatham, was largely attended. The pall bearers were Pilot Master Robert Walls and Messrs. Oliver Foster, Angus McLean, James McCallum, Maxime Martin, Reuben Nowlin—all pilots. Deceased was one of the best pilots of the port. He was in his 46th year.—Advance.

SHOT AT A CHARIVARI.—Mr. Thomas Jardine, of Indiantown, North. Co., was married on Wednesday, and the youth of the neighborhood gathered around his father's house in the evening to charivari the newly wedded pair. They were there with guns, horns, cowbells and other instruments for making noise, and the occupants of the house grew weary of the demonstration. Mr. Alex. Jardine, the bridegroom's father, ordered the serenaders to depart, and they made more noise than ever. Then he fired a blank charge, and when they found that nobody had been hurt they resumed the serenade. A second blank charge did not scare them, and then Mr. Jardine loaded with small shot and fired. A youth named Benj. Young was hit in the neck and hurt quite seriously. This put an end to the charivari. No arrest had been made yesterday.—World.

MORE TUBERCULOSIS.—The recent discovery of tuberculosis in a valuable Kings county herd of cattle convinced Mr. Wm. Shaw, M. P., that all stock should be inspected. As a result he had Dr. Frink, veterinary officer, examine his herd. The inspection was made only a few days ago and two valuable animals were found infected and had to be slaughtered. The rest of the herd was free from the dread disease. Dr. Frink, talking to a Globe reporter, expressed the belief that tuberculosis was very prevalent among cattle in this province. It is possible the government will take steps to have a general inspection. One man thought the Provincial government, instead of making a cattle importation, should devote the money to reimbursing those who are compelled to slaughter valuable animals because of the disease.—Globe.

LONDON, April 27.—A despatch received at one of the U. S. embassies here, from Athens says that King George, of Greece, may at any moment be deposed or assassinated and that the mob is likely to take possession of the city. The despatch adds that the worst is feared.

A Terrible Fatality.

St. JOHN, April 22.—A sad accident occurred this afternoon by which the 3 year old daughter of Albert Marr was killed. The child was crossing Main street when an electric car on which there was no fender came dashing up the street. The car passed over the body and dragged it for some distance. The child was literally cut in two. An inquest will be held to-morrow morning.

—The annual meeting of the Adogawasook fishing club will be held at the hotel Brunswick, Moncton, on Tuesday, May 4th.

—Herring have struck in large quantities along the coast. "You can walk on them," said a fisherman. But you know a little allowance must be made. Fishermen make free use of hype bole, as a rule.

—Capt. George Irving, of Kingston, who has spent the last two years in the United States, arrived here last week and will take charge of Mr. Keady Lanigan's schooner Tartar.

—Robert Thorne, second son of Mr. John Thorne, was instantly killed in the Calais quarry at Saint George Thursday by being hit on the head by a piece of stone from a blast. He was 24 years of age and a general favorite.

—In the arbitration case of Grattan vs. O'Leary, the arbitrators awarded the plaintiff \$925.00 with costs. The latter amounted to about four hundred dollars. Messrs. B. Deacon, of Shediac, David I. Welch, of Moncton, and John T. Caie, of Richibucto, were the arbitrators.

—The Kingston bridge is having a hard time of it. The running ice has knocked the recently driven piles from under the big span. We should not be surprised to hear of its collapse any day. We hope, however, that no lives will be lost when it falls.

—A batch of interesting notes from Buctouche reached us on Monday, but as the writer did not send name in confidence we cannot publish the items. No newspaper will print any communication from anonymous correspondents and it is only a waste of time and postage to send notes without giving name and address.

—Perhaps what was the finest goose of the season was shot by Mr. Coster American on Tuesday evening, in Mr. Malcolm McKinnon's field, about five minute's walk from the station house. The bird weighed 14 lbs. and was shot at a distance of 123 yds. This we believe is the longest shot of the season as well as the largest bird. It is not often geese are shot so near the town.

—The house and barn on the Caledonia Road, Scotch Settlement, known as the Thompson place and occupied by J. H. Hanington and family were totally destroyed by fire on Thursday last. In the barn were one horse and three cows, all of which were destroyed together with some agricultural implements. The fire caught in the chimney of the house and a heavy wind was blowing at the time. There was

no insurance either on the building or contents, and the loss will be a severe one to Mr. Hanington.

—O'Leary's mill began operations yesterday.

—Four hundred gallons of beer were seized and spilled at the Biddeford, Me., Bottling Co.'s warehouse on Friday.

—The erstwhile slang has changed from "Don't jump your trolley," to "Don't puncture your tire."

—Lobster fishermen are preparing as rapidly as possible for the season's fishing. Some have their set-lines placed, but no traps have yet been set.

—A tremendous explosion occurred in the underground railway, London, Monday, as a train filled with men from the city was making its usual stop at the Aldersgate station. The glass roof of the station was blown out and the platform was strewn with debris. Ten of the passengers are in a precarious condition.

—A carefully planned expedition left for Cuba Sunday night from near Sea Isle City, N. J. Getting out to sea all hands were transferred to a black-painted steamer that quickly started south. In the way of munitions the expedition took along a Hotchkiss gun, nearly 5,400 rifles, 120,000 rounds of ammunition, 2,000 machetes, a lot of medicine and what is known as an experimental flying machine, to be adapted, if possible, to the use of dynamite.

—One of our subscribers who had a fine pair of snowshoes last winter, was called on by a friend lately, who had occasion to visit the shed chamber for something, and discovered a pair of snowshoe bows. Returning to the house he asked the owner what he was going to do with those spare snowshoe bows. "Bows?" said the owner, "I have no spare bows, only one pair of snowshoes;" whereupon his friend took him to the loft, and it is said that if the rats that ate the filling had been present, they would have lain down and died with fright at the "cuss" words which followed.

—Several weeks ago a young man representing himself to be the advance advertising agent of the "Hong Kong Nursery Co.," of Chinawas in Houlton, Me., advertising the wonderful Chinese water lily bulb. He had one of the lilies growing in a glass jar and had some of the bulbs which he would sell to those who did not care to wait until the arrival of the main firm, which was represented as then being in Fredericton, and would shortly reach Houlton. He did not warrant the bulbs to grow, but said that the other agents would replace all bulbs which did not grow when they came along. They have not arrived as yet, but it is said there is an opening for them to do a large business in exchanging bulbs when they do.
