Murderer Kelly

AMESBURY, Mass., April 22.-The news of the arrest and subsequent confession of guilt as the murderer of cashier Stickney of the Great Falls National bank of Somersworth, N. B., has prostrated the mother of Joseph E. Kelly. Since yesterday there has been much talk here about Kelly's probable insanity and many references have been heard to the fall which he sustained when a child, the facts of which have been recalled since the first intimation of Kelly's possible connection with the murder.

It is expected that this will be urged as extenuation for the crime when Kelly comes before the courts.

The Turks Win.

LONDON, April 24. - An official despatch dated to-day from the Turkish commander of the army corps at Janina, Epirus, announces that after a desperate battle lasting over seven hours, the Turks have captured Fort Beshpoumad, where the Greeks were entrenched after crossing the frontier.

Special despatches from Athens this afternoon say that after a desperate battle at Mati, the Greeks were outnumbered retreated with heavy loss; abandoned Tyranvo and Larissa, and removed the Greek headquarters to Pharsalos, a small town on the right bank of the Phersalitis and at the north foot of Asp, the Chassidiari mountains. Pharsalos is about twenty miles due south of Larissa.

ATHENS, April 24., Noon .- The Turks, at noon yesterday, strongly attacked Mati, which was defended by General Mastaphos' brigade After six hours fighting a council of war, presided over by the crown prince, decided to order the retreat of the Greek forces from Tyrnavo. The retreat was effected in good order. Raccotti Garibaldi has arrived here and was accorded an enthusiastic reception.

Dr. Waton, who was in London yesterday, said to a representative of the Associated Press :- 'It is impossible for me to say what line of defence I shall adopt. My case may be thrown out on technical grounds; or it may be argued on its mer its, and it might even end in a regular libel. In any case, I have stated what I believe to be the truth, and I shall not recant. I will fight to the bitter end.'

Mr. Kennedy Moore, who brings the charge against Dr. Watson, says: 'The petition has been purposely framed not to charge Dr. Watson with erroneous opinions. This was done to avoid a trial for heresy and to settle the matter if possible by drawing a statement from Dr. Watson which will satisfy the church.'

DIPLOMACY AVERTS INTERNATIONAL COMPLICATIONS.

How a Negro Justice of the Peace Held a British Vessel With a Writ of "Ne Exeat Republicum"-The Writ Was Dissolved In Liquor and a Laugh Went Around.

During the reign of the carpetbaggers in Georgia a very black but brainy old negro named Tunis G. Campbell came down from the north and became one of the leaders of his race.

In the course of time Campbell was made a justice of the peace at the port of Darien. Then the trouble began in

Justice Campbell had no use for the whites because he knew that they cordially hated him.

But he did not confine his animosity to Georgians or to Democrats. He employed a number of negro constables, authorized them to carry weapons, and in a short time made his court a terror to the community.

So much by way of introduction. One summer a British sailing vessel came to Darien and took on a cargo of naval stores. Before getting ready to sail the captain settled everything due from him and his crew-that is, everything in the way of a just account. He secured his papers, when several negro traders of the lowest class unexpectedly put in claims for goods that had never been purchased.

These cormorants alleged that the captain and his sailors were indebted to them for meals, merchandise, lodging and other things.

It was evident that these claims were fraudulent, and the captain continued his preparations for his departure. The afternoon he was to weigh anchor Justice Campbell held a consultation

. The shyster's resources were limited, and he explained to his friend that regnum meant kingdom, and as this country was a republic there would have to be a change in the verbiage.

"Change it," commanded the black The lawyer then admitted that he

knew very little Latin, and for that reason was somewhat embarrassed. "This is a republic," he said.

"All right," was the prompt reply of Camptell. "Draw up a writ of ne exeat republicum." "I am afraid it is bad Latin," object-

ed the lawyer. "I'll make it stick," answered the justice. "I'll sign the paper and swear in six special constables to enforce it." This was enough, and the lawyer pro-

ceeded to draw up the most remarkable

document ever seen in America. The writ covered 20 pages of foolscap and ordered the Englishman, under the severest pains and penalties, to remain with his ship at Darien until he settled all claims.

It was a sultry August afternoon, and the vessel was about ready to depart, when it was boarded by Justice Campbell and six negro constables armed with

The justice read the writ to the captain, and after informing him that the constables would remain until the matter was adjusted the judicial tyrant went ashore again.

The captain retired to the cabin with the mate and talked it over.

Finally a plan of action was agreed upon, and when the ship's officers reappeared they were apparently in a good humor. They told the constables that they were welcome as the representatives of the law and requested them to mjoy the freedom of the vessel.

The constables were overwhelmed with tobacco and cigars and an occasional dram until their suspicions van-

Then the captain and his crew displayed still more hospitality, and the bottle was freely passed around.

At midnight six negro constables were in a drunken slumber, the effect of their dragged liquor, and the captain and his men were wide awake and perfectly

The constables were picked up next day and sent to jail for neglect of duty, but the vessel was then beyond reach. The British captain went straight to

If I were you, I would not hold a friendly government responsible for the conduct of a few ignorant persons, who have not been free long enough to know their own rights and respect the rights of others.

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
