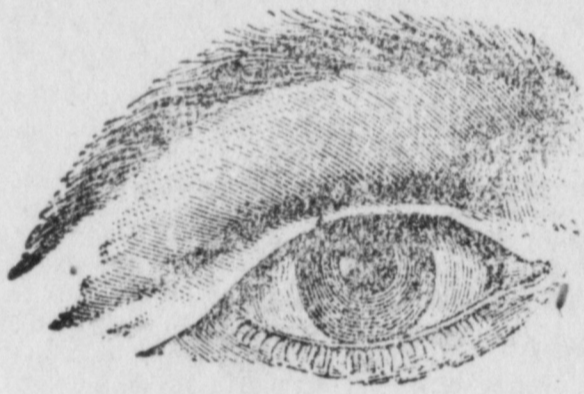

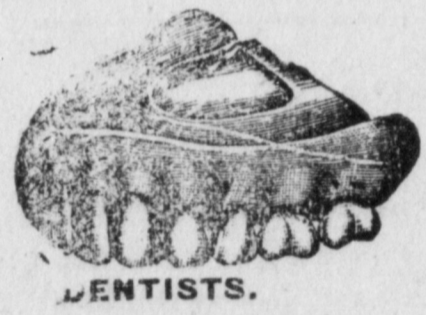

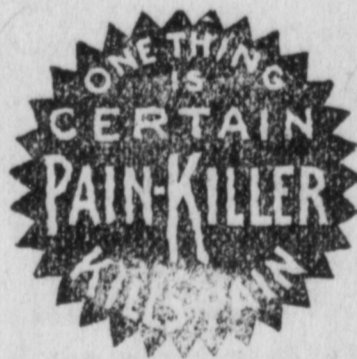

Grindstones, formerly \$1.75 per ton, to be 20 per cent.
Granite flag stones and free stones and all manufactures of stone, formerly 30 per cent to be 25 per cent.
Marble, manufactures of, 35 per cent.
Roofing slate to be 35 per cent. and slate mantles 30 per cent.
Watch cases, formerly 25 per cent., to be 30 per cent.
Glass, 30 per cent. and German looking glasses 25 per cent.
Cutlery, formerly in two or three classes now to be uniform, 30 per cent.
Leather board, formerly 20 per cent., to be 25 per cent.
Iron and steel scrap, formerly \$4 per ton, to be \$1.50 per ton.
Pig iron and cast scrap, formerly \$4 per ton to be \$2.50.
Iron and steel ingots, billets, puddled bars, etc., formerly \$5, now \$4 per ton.
Wires, N. E. S., formerly 25 per cent to be 20 per cent.

Mowing machines and farm machinery remain about as before.
The excise duty on spirits is increased from \$1.70 to \$1.90 per gallon and there is a new excise duty on imported raw leaf tobacco of 10 cents and 14 cents for unstemmed and stemmed tobacco.
The above is what the finance minister calls the general tariff. A lower tariff schedule is proposed on the products of all countries which admit Canadian goods as favorable as Canada under this provision will admit theirs. The schedule goes into force at once and makes a straight cut of one eighth in the general tariff until July 1898, when the cut will be one fourth, leaving the tariff as against Great Britain seven-eighths of a general tariff and after the next year, three-fourths. This reduction will not apply to spirituous and malt liquors, sugar and tobacco, but includes all other articles.
Another resolution provides that when it comes to the knowledge of the government that a trust or combine in any article of trade enhances the price and that such purpose is assisted by the tariff, the government may remove all or part of the duty on such articles.
From the tariff changes M. Fielding estimated the following effects on the revenue. He expects the revenue to lose \$217,000 on iron, \$275,000 on woollen goods, \$66,000 on cottons, and \$147,000 on corn, a total of about \$700,000. The increase he estimates as follows: From excise on spirits \$500,000, from cigarettes \$100,000, from customs duty on tobacco \$170,000, and from excise duty on tobacco leaf manufactured \$1,000,000. The total gains over losses will he thinks be a million dollars which will wipe out the deficit mentioned in the early part of his speech. He proposes to compensate the iron manufacturers by increasing the bounty on steel ingots, puddled bars and pig iron to \$4. Hon. Mr. Fielding announced that in case the United States restored the coal duty to 40 cents per ton Canada would make the same reduction.
In reply to Sir Charles Tupper he expressed the opinion that British trade treaties with Germany and Belgium would not interfere with the proposed preferential trade program.
