DON'T GO TO ROSSLAND.—A Haligonian who went to Rossland, B. C., a few weeks ago, writes among other things: This particular camp at present is as dull as dish water. The snow on the level in the main street is from three to five feet deep and goodness only knows what it is in the mountains. Until such time as those hills are bare, which will be at the earliest between May 1st and 15th, it is bound to be dull. Prospectors can't get out and consequently they are not purchasing their outfits. Business is practically at a standstill, the mining brokers are doing very little and everywhere you hear, "wait till the snow leaves the mountains." The rush from Canada and the United States in a short time will be awful. The country cannot stand it. Numbers of men are out of employment. No young man should come out here who has not money to invest or enough to keep him for at least two or three months, and anyone who throws up a fairly good job in Halifax is the worst kind of a fool.
