#### 'Ivan MacLaren' Heresy Case

LONDON, April, 9.—At a meeting to day of the Durham Presbytery to arrange for the impending meeting of the synod there the Rev. J. Middlemass of Sunderland remarked that Dr. Kennedy Moore had laid upon the table of the synod a petition charging the Rev. John Watson ('Ivan MacLaren'), the well-known novelist, with defective if not erroneous views Dr. Moore's pamphlet pronouncing the charge, had been sent to every minister in the presbytery. A letter had, however, been printed in the magazine, the 'Presbyterian,' in which the moderator, Dr. Balmorie, contended that Dr. Moore's views were unsound and might similarly be described as defective, if not erroneous. Dr. Middlemass suggested that the moderator also table a petition regarding Dr. Moore. He added that the spectacle of three doctors of divinity engaged in a triangular combat might perhaps be edifying, but anyhow, it let the world see how they loved one another, and what they regarded as of supreme vital importance in church life. He was sure if Dr. Balmorie charged Dr. Moore with holding defective if not erroneous views of Dr. Watson's teaching, he would have the whole Presbytery of Durham at his back.

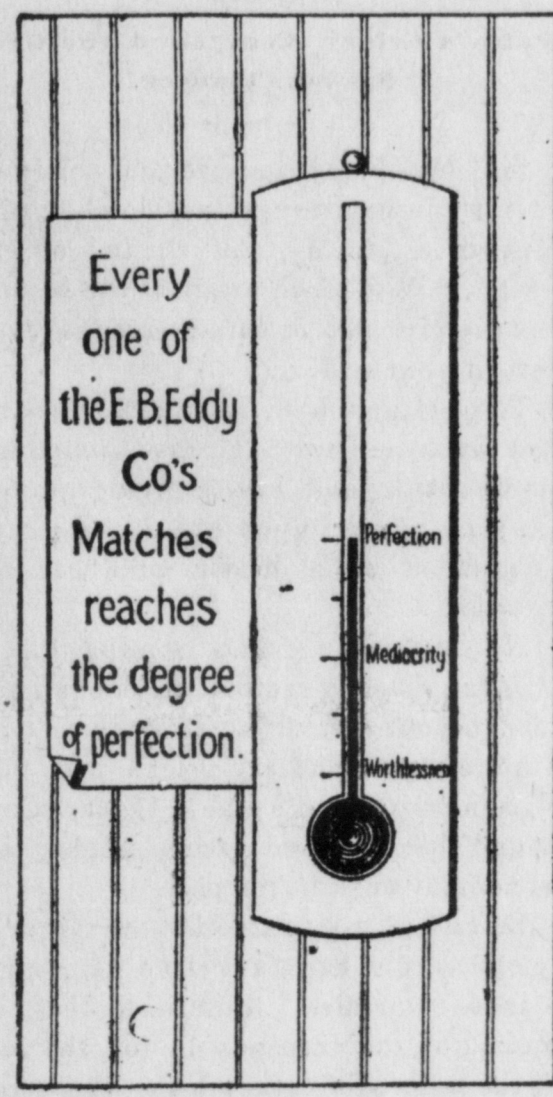
