

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, April 8.—Replying to Mr. Gillis to-day, Hon. Mr. Fielding said he did not remember whether the Halifax Chronicle's report of his speech in Sydney was accurate. The recent report of his Montreal remarks to the coal men was correct. The Finance Minister went on to declare that he was always in favor of free coal in case American coal was admitted free into this country, but not otherwise. He also held that the coal duty must be considered as part of the general policy of Canada and not by itself alone.

The afternoon was devoted to Charlton's Sunday bill, which deals with Sunday newspapers and Sunday trains, and got a second reading, and Mr. McLean's bill providing for reduced return fare with second class as well as first class railway tickets.

Mr. Laurier did not approve of Mr. McLean's programme for compelling railways to reduce the price of return tickets or to issue return tickets to all. He was backed up by Messrs Lister, Campbell and other government supporters but the bill was allowed a second reading and went to the Railway committee, from which it is not likely to emerge.

The short evening session was devoted to a discussion of a bill about a Loan Company.

The Senate to-day passed the address, Hon. Mr. Mills making the principal oration.

The Chamber will meet tomorrow and adjourn for a fortnight.

The main estimates brought down to-day are the first instalment of the proposed expenditure for the next fiscal year. How much is left for the supplementaries cannot yet be known, but the House is now asked to appropriate \$38,111,663 for the next fiscal year. This is \$1,587,262 less than the appropriation made last August for the current year but probably more than this margin will be asked for later. The amount already asked, for next year, may be compared with the total expenditure of \$36,949,142 in the last year of the late government, showing an increase of over a million plus the supplementaries. There is an increase in the interest charges but this is off set by the saving of \$170,000 by the reduction of savings bank interest from three and a half to three per cent. No authoritative announcement of this change had been made until it appeared in the estimates.

James Manchester is here in the interest of a scheme to secure from Sir Donald Smith and others land in New Brunswick which produces pulp wood for a contemplated pulp mill at Grand Falls.

Mr. Fielding's reply last evening to the deputation asking for an export duty on logs and pulp wood was not encouraging. He reminded them that great caution was necessary in this retaliatory business.

OTTAWA April 9.—The first motion this session in condemnation of the ministry was proposed by Hon. Mr. Foster this afternoon in amendment to Mr. Fitzpatrick's motion for the second reading of the franchise bill. Mr. Foster rose to protest against the introduction of the least important part of the government programme while the one measure for which the country was waiting was postponed. The Solicitor General had himself declared that the franchise bill would do no service for three years. The ministers themselves had declared that the most absorbing and important measure for which the country was waiting was the tariff. Three months ago their organ, the Toronto Globe, thinking that parliament would then be called, pointed out the grave urgency of immediately taking up this measure and only last week the Globe's financial editor stated that the wholesale trade was stagnant and would be till the tariff was known. Three years ago Premier Laurier denounced the then government for not bringing down the tariff measure as soon as the house met, yet here was the ministry which declared its intention of revolutionizing the trade policy with-holding the tariff for nine months. One session had passed without anything being done, a second session was three times postponed and now after two weeks the tariff was passed over in favor of measures which would be idle on the statute books for three years. The session was already late and there besides the tariff bill matters of greater immediate importance than the franchise bill. Mr. Foster then devoted an hour to a rehearsal of the vacillating and contradictory declarations of the ministers, setting forth conflicting declarations opposite each other amid almost continuous cheers. When Mr. Fielding's declarations two days ago were contrasted with the declarations on which his leader appealed to the country there was manifest uneasiness on the government side.

After recess Hon. Mr. Foster resumed his speech, condemning the government for announcing some proposed tariff changes while delaying the introduction of the measure. It seemed that their remained something which it was deemed desirable to conceal until after the Nova Scotia elections. The delay in bringing down the tariff was evidently due to some political necessity requiring the Nova Scotia elections out of the way before the tariff came on. The ministers knew that if the

duties on coal and iron were continued the duty on farm implements must stand. This would violate the pledges made in Manitoba and effect the pending bye elections there. He therefore moved that the "consideration of the franchise be deferred until the tariff bill has been disposed of by the house."

The amendment of Mr. Foster was not expected by the government. Mr. Cameron had arranged to make a second speech on the government side and was primed to attack the present Franchise law.

Mr. Clancey replied, supporting the amendment.

The house adjourned at 10.15. When the house adjourns on Wednesday next it will stand adjourned to the following Tuesday.

The Senate adjourned to-day for a fortnight.

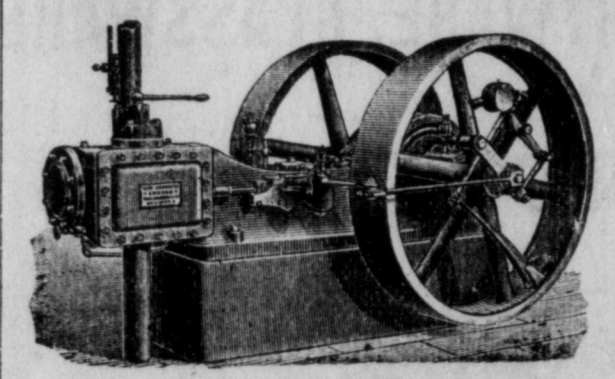
