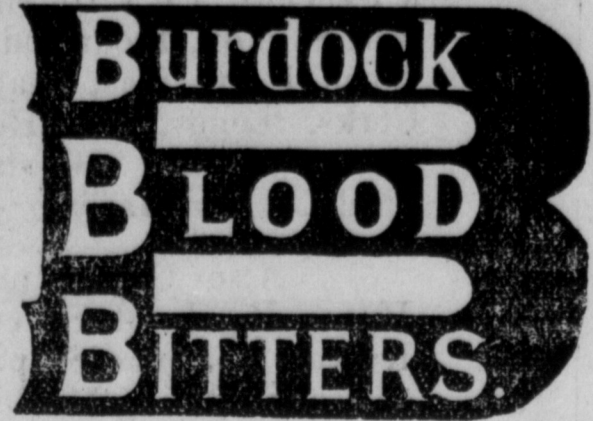
LEGAL.—Before Judge Wells at Moncton, on the 19th inst., the review case, James Brown vs. Albert Taylor, was heard. The case was tried before B. S. Bailey, Esq., at Harcourt and a verdict entered for the plaintiff for \$62. The defendant on review moved to set aside the judgment, and for a non-suit or new trial. The judgment was set aside and a new trial granted with costs. D. I. Welch for Defendant, D. Grant for Plaintiff.

Before John T. Caie, P. C. Commissioner, on Saturday last, the suit, W. H. McLeod, Assignee of Grogan & Co., vs. Jacob Trites, came on for trial when the case was settled by payment of the amount agreed upon between the parties and costs. Mr. Phinney for Plaintiff, Mr. Sayre for Defendant.

THE LATE H. A. FORSTER.—His numerous friends in Richibucto and Kingston, were much grieved to learn of the death at Dorchester on Sunday last of Henry A. Forster, Barrister-at-Law. Mr. Forster was born at Richibucto 44 years ago, and received his education here. He studied law in the office of the late D. S. Kerr, St. John, and was admitted to the Bar in 1875. He practiced for some time at Dorchester, and afterwards returned to Richibucto, where after practising on his own account for some time, he entered into partnership with J. D. Phinney, Esq., and upon the election of the latter to the local legislature was appointed to the office of Clerk of the County Court previously held by Mr. Phinney. He subsequently went out to the Western Coast, where he remained until compelled by failure of his health to return to New Brunswick a few weeks ago. He has since resided with his brother, Warden J. B. Forster, at whose home his death occurred. The body was brought to Richibucto for interment in the English

Church Cemetery, and he buried took place on Tuesday from the residence of Mr. D. J. Cochrane on Tuesday afternoon and was largely attended. Rev. H. A. Meek performing the ceremonies. The pall bearers were: Robert Hutchison, C. J. Sayre, J. D. Phinney, W. D. Carter, G. V. McInerney and R. H. Davis.

—The P. E. Island legislature is dissolved, nomination is set for July 14, polling on the 21st. The polling is on the day previous to that fixed for voting on the Scott Act in Charlottetown. Temperance people do not like this arrangement. The ministerial party have the utmost confidence of carrying the country.

—Mr. James Barnes, of Molus River received the sad news of the drowning of his son, Richard, at Greenville, Maine, on Thursday last. No particulars of the accident have yet been received. The body was buried at Greenville on Saturday. The young man was 26 years of age, and has been living at Greenville for about six years.

—The fisherman, who are drifting for mackerel off the harbor, report having seen numerous strange fish. They are, from the description given, more like a lizard than anything else. They are about eighteen inches long and less than an inch in thickness. They are supplied with four legs, are of a bright green colour and when taken on board the boats emit a greenish liquid. Most of the fishermen are afraid to handle them lest they be poisonous.

—On Saturday morning, the harness shop on the road between town and Kingsston, occupied by Mr. W. A. P. Rhodes, was destroyed by fire. Mr. Rhodes had lighted a fire for the purpose of heating some material used in his work, and left the shop to procure a pail of water. During his absence, the inside of the building caught fire, and was soon in a mass of flame. There was no water near, nor was there any person around to render assistance. Besides the building, Mr. Rhodes lost all his tools and stock. His loss will be quite heavy.

—The news of the sudden death at Fredericton, on Wednesday last, of Mr. W. R. Roney, caused quite a shock to his friends here, where Mr. Roney had made numerous acquaintances during his visits as Inspector of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax. He has recently been in charge of the branch of that institution at Fredericton, on Monday afternoon, after the close of the bank, he went up the road on horse back for a ride. On his return, when near the city, he was seen to fall from his horse, and when reached, life was extinct. Death was due to heart disease. Mr. Roney was married to a daughter of Dr. A. H. Chandler, son of the late Lieutenant Governor Chandler. Mrs. Roney and three children, the eldest of whom is six years of age, survive him.

—At Yarmouth, N. S., Mrs. Robert Cate and Miss Clara Killam daughters of the late Samuel Killam of that town, last week made a gift of the splendid property known as the N. K. Clement's homestead including a park in the way of ornamentation, and with a noble mansion in the centre and a pretty little keeper's lodge in the midst of the gates, the whole forming one of the finest places of the kind in the Province. The property was a free contribution to the hospital project provided \$25,000 was raised towards the fund. The property was valued at \$50,000 from

—Miss Jerusha Horton, housekeeper for Mr. George Wilson, was seized with a paralytic stroke while attending divine service in St. Mary's church Sunday evening. She was taken home and Dr. Bourque summoned; but she never rallied, and died at 1 o'clock, Wednesday. She was 67 years old.

—Mackerel have struck fairly plentiful off the harbor. On Monday night some of the boats with drift nets caught as high as 600 fish. Upwards of fifty barrels were shipped to the American market Tuesday. Tuesday night more boats were out, but the average per boat was not so large. The fish are not of a uniform size—some are small while others are very large.

—The annual meeting of the Bible Society was held in the Methodist church on Thursday last. There was a good audience and the speeches of Revs. W. Lawson, H. A. Meek and Mr. McKelvie were listened to with great interest. The collection was an excellent one and prospects of increased subscriptions was said to be hopeful.

—We have received from Mr. John Marshall, of Tacoma, Wash., late of Bass River, a copy of New Herald, published at the former place, which contains a good cut and a lengthy description of one of the forest monarchs of that part of Uncle Sam's territory. The tree which was fir, was 30ft. long and contains 10,000 sup. ft. Mr. Marshall also sent us a small piece of the tree. It resembles Southern hard pine. Boards 6ft. wide have been cut from it.

—The closing examinations of the Kingston public school took place on Tuesday. Mrs. R. A. deOlloqui was present and awarded prizes for the best essays on the Canadian Flag. The winners were, Miss English, 1st; Miss Vera deOlloqui, 2nd; and Miss Maggie Fraser, 3rd. The judges in the contest were, Messrs. Geo. E. Hutchinson and Robt. Girvan. H. M. Ferguson, Sec'y, to Trustees, generously treated all the scholars to candy. Short addresses were made by Mrs. deOlloqui, Principal Man and Mr. Ferguson. Mrs. deOlloqui and Mr. Ferguson promised substantial prizes for next year.
