

THE LATE H. A. FORSTER. - His numerous friends in Richibucto and Kingston were much grieved to learn of the death at Dorchester on Sunday last of Henry A. Forster, Barrister at-Law. Mr. Forster was born at Richibucto 44 years ago. alu received his education here. He studied law in the office of the late D. S. Kerr, St. John, and was admitted to the Bar in 1875. He practiced for some time at Dorchester, and afterwards returned to Richibucto where after practising on his own account for some time, he entered into partnership with J. D. Phinney. Esq., and upon the election of the latter to the local legislature was appointed to the office of Clerk of the County Court previously held by Mr. Painney. He subsequently went out to the Western Coast, where he remained until compelled by failure of his health to return to New Brunswick a few weeks ago. He has since resided with his brother Warden J. 




