

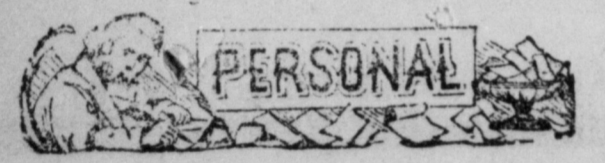


SMELT SHIPMENTS.—Below will be found a statement of the smelt shipmen's via the K. N. Railway for the last two seasons:
