

Execution of Sullivan. At 8.38 last Friday morning, March 12, John E. Sullivan, convicted of the murder of Eliza and Harris Dutcher, at Meadow Brook, suffered the extreme penalty of the law.

He remained to the end as he had been ever since arrested—one of the calmest and most unconcerned men in whatever situation he was placed.

Yesterday afternoon his spiritual advisers were with him almost continually. His aged father, two young brothers and two younger sisters called to see him.

Sullivan ate heartily before retiring last night and this morning partook sparingly of his breakfast. He told his gaoler that this would be the happiest day in his life; but he made nothing in the nature of a confession.

Arriving at the scaffold, Sullivan surveyed it thoroughly, but displayed no fear. His spiritual adviser asked him if he forgave every one in the world, and in this interrogation, Sullivan replied in a firm voice without nervousness: "I forgive all men."

He then recited prayers in a low voice, and bade good-bye to several officials and acquaintances, including the hangman, Radcliffe.

The black cap and noose were adjusted, and after Sullivan had cautioned the hangman to make no mistake, the weight fell, and the body bounded up.

All was over—John E. Sullivan, guilty or innocent, was no more. He died with out making a public statement of his connection with the terrible crime, which has made the Meadow Brook locality famous.

The Boy Gladstone. Sir Roderick Murchison, the famous naturalist, has left it on record that Gladstone was "the prettiest little boy that ever went to Eton."

Among his other mates were some whose names will still be remembered in America—Frederick Tennyson, for example, brother of the poet, and himself a poet; Alexander Kinglake, the author of "Eothen," and the historian of the Crimean war; James Bruce, afterward the famous Earl of Elgin; Charles Canning, afterward Earl Canning and Viceroy of India, "the Clemency Canning" of the India Mutiny—a nickname then given to him in scorn by the panic-stricken votaries of a policy of slaughter, but now remembered to his honor and to his glory.

William Gladstone was not much of an athlete, as the term was then understood. He did not care much about school-boy games of any kind. He was very fond of sculling, and kept a boat for his own use, and he was then, as ever since, a tremendous walker.

He walked great distances. His delight was to wander about through all the lovely places surrounding Windsor in company with a few boys of his own age and of his own tastes.

Three Score Lives Lost. EVANSVILLE, Ind., March 10.—A report reaches here that a passenger train of the Evansville and Terre Haute railroad has gone through a bridge over White river, and that all on board were drowned.

St. LOUIS, March 10.—A special to the Chronicle from Princeton, Ind., says a frightful wreck occurred early this morning ten miles north of that place on the Evansville & Terre Haute Railroad.

During the past week several small bridges and large sections of the track have been washed away, but every precaution had been taken to avoid accidents.

In spite of all this passenger train No. 5 had the track washed out from under it and the smoking car lies at the bottom of the river with every passenger in it lost.

The balance of the train is lodged fifty or seventy-five yards from the track. Conductor Sears and the fireman are known to be among the lost.

On account of the wash-out and the breaking of telegraph wires no word can be received on the Princeton side of the river, and it is not known whether any of the passengers in the day coaches are lost.

CINCINNATI, March 11.—A special from Terre Haute says that fifteen lives were lost in the Princeton wreck.

TERRE HAUTE, March 10.—The reports received here are that of more than seventy passengers in the wreck less than ten were taken out alive.

Nothing can be seen except the smokestack of the locomotive and the top of the rear pullman. Several bodies had been recovered at ten o'clock, including those of the engineer and fireman.

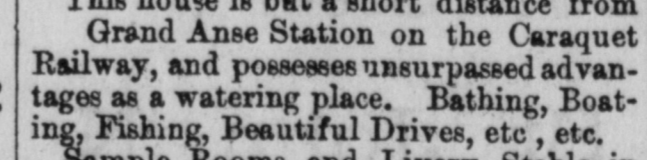
