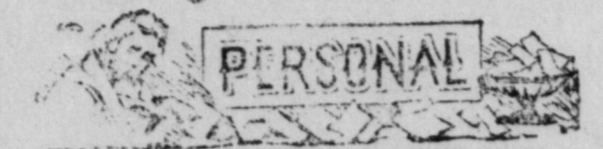
—The residence of Mr. Stephen Cameron, at Cameron's Mills was destroyed by fire with all its contents on Wednesday night last.
