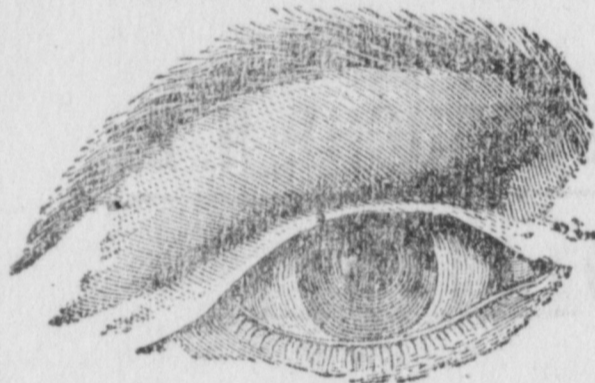

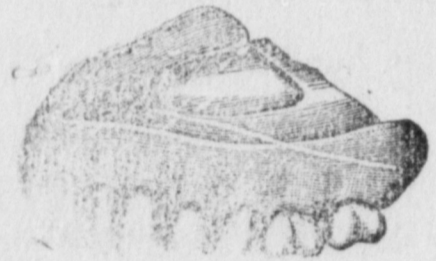

Excitement in Kent County.

To the Editor of the Globe:

SIR,—Seldom in this county have we anything to live up to political circles like the commotion caused two or three weeks ago by the rumor that C. Richardson was to be dismissed from the office of Stenographic Magistrate and Registrar of Probates and Mr. Robert Davis, of Charlotte county, appointed in his stead. The story was so preposterous on the face of it that very few people gave it credence, but when Mr. Davis eventually arrived and opened up an office a regular howl of indignation went up from the people. It is said that there are two sides to everything, but in this matter there seems to be but one. They all have the one story; all sing the same song to the same air. Grits and Tories, friends of the Local government and those opposed to it, English-speaking and Acadian—all have joined hands in one common cause. We never had anything like it in the county. Why, the Phinney-McInerney deal pales into insignificance compared with it. Really, it is monotonous; no one to argue with. Under the circumstances, if the government make this appointment one cannot help but admire their courage. As to what will be said of their judgment is another thing.

Others said the gentleman, who is a native of Kent, was simply returning home and, as he is a J. P., intended opening an office, as he had a perfect right to do.

Greece Calls Out 40,000 Men.

ATHENS, March 5.—Warlike preparations here continue without abatement. The reserves of 1891, 1890, 1889 and 1888 have been summoned to join the colors and are responding with alacrity. All seem imbued with a desire for open hostilities against the Turks and the greatest enthusiasm is reported everywhere. It is stated there will be a general mobilization of Greek forces later.

The cabinet council, which met last evening, after Premier Delyannis interviewed with King George, sat until 1 o'clock this morning. It is reported that as a result of the deliberations of the ministers several important decisions were reached. According to the report the cabinet determined upon the action of the Greek fleet upon the coast of Macedonia, with a view of aiding the mobilization of the Macedonian forces, the guarding of the Macedonian towns devolving upon the gendarmerie and depot battalions. It is estimated that Greece will soon have 100,000 men under arms, including the reserves. The Greek ironclads Spezia and Tzara have sailed from the Piræus under sealed orders.

CANEA, March 5.—The city now presents a calmer appearance than it has for a long time and a more secure feeling prevails. A Russian warship has arrived here from a cruise around the island. Her commander reports that fighting has been going on in the vicinity of all the coast towns: It is reported that a great number of Mohammedans have been killed in the villages near Sitia.

The British consul at this place has started for Selino to endeavor to relieve the Turks, who are besieged there by the Cretan insurgents.

LONDON, March 5.—In reply to a letter from the editor of the Chronicle, Mr. Gladstone writes from the south of France that to expel the Greek troops from Crete and keep as police the butchers of Armenia would further deepen the disgrace of the powers.

Sir Charles Dilke, Sir Thomas Reid, Henry Labouchere, John Dillon, Herbert Gladstone, the Right Hon. A. J. Mundella and nearly one hundred other Liberal

members of the House of Commons have subscribed their names to a letter to the King of Greece paying him a tribute for his services to Crete and expressing hope for the future safety and welfare of Greece. The Standard says that the letter has excited indignation among the supporters of the government, as it is calculated to encourage the King to resist the powers.

A Constantinople correspondent telegraphs that the police have reported that ten thousand Greek residents of the city are preparing to make trouble. Orders have been issued from the Yildiz Kiosk that exceptional precautions are to be taken in view of the bitter feeling between the Greeks and Mussulmans.

PARIS, March 5.—The Figaro publishes a reported interview with M. Delyannis, Prime Minister of Greece, had by the correspondent of the paper in Athens. The Greek premier is quoted as saying that the Greek troops would not, under any circumstances, be withdrawn from Crete. They were there to stay, he declared, and in addition to that the temper of the people of Greece would compel the government to invade Turkey. Greece, M. Delyannis said, merely asked for a plebiscite to show that the inhabitants of the Island of Crete are overwhelmingly in favor of union with the Greek kingdom. Anyway, he declared, Greece would prefer to disappear from the map of Europe rather than draw back from the position she has taken.

LONDON, March 5.—The Greek consul here has received a telegram from Athens stating that forty thousand Greek troops have been called out and are to be dispatched to the Turkish frontier with the least possible delay.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

FREDERICTON, March 2.—The Municipalities committee this morning resolved to recommend to the House the bill authorizing the town of Campbellton to expropriate the Campbellton Power and Water Co.'s system and franchises.

John H. Reid's bill, by which he seeks to compel the city of Fredericton to pay him \$2,300 on account of the old exhibition building, was before the same committee during the last hour of their forenoon session.

Mr. Fowler, of Kings, presented the case for Mr. Reid and Mayor Vanwart was heard in opposition to the bill, the latter finishing just before adjournment at one o'clock.

The committee will meet again at 4 this afternoon, when City Clerk Beckwith and Secretary of Agriculture Inches will be heard in opposition, and Mr. Fowler again in reply.

In 1866 the Legislature passed an act authorizing the city of Fredericton to issue debentures for \$1,500, the proceeds of which were to be applied towards paying off liabilities outstanding against the exhibition building erected by the York Agricultural Society, of which Mr. Reid is president, but the act provided that no debentures should be issued thereunder, unless the City Council should be satisfied that the amount of their proposed contribution should be sufficient, together with a provincial grant of \$5,000 and a grant
