The report comes from Fredericton that Mr. Caleb Richardson of this town is to be dismissed from the office of Stipendiary magistrate and that of Registrar of Probate for the County of Kent and the two positions given to one Mr. R. H. Davis, barrister, of St. George, Charlotte County, who in that event will remove to the County of Kent. It is further reportel that Messrs Barnes and Leger, two of our representatives, have recommended veau, Louis Goslin. the appointment of Mr. Davis to these these two gentlemen would assent to such a proposition. The lawyers of Kent have always taken a foremost place at the Bar of this province and any one of our practising attorneys takes as high if not a higher place in the profession than Mr. Davis. Yet it is proposed to pass them all over and give two of our county offices to an outsider, a stranger, and a gentleman who has never paid a dollar into the treasury of the county. Such an appointment would be condemned by the entire county and we do not believe our representatives will so far disregard the wishes of their constituents as to sanction it. We believe that the electors of the county would take the first opportunity offered of showing in a most emphatic manner their want of confidence in any representative or any government that would be a party to such an arrangement.

THE EASTERN: WAR-CLOUD.

When the world's long peace was broken by the Crimean war of forty odd years ago, the first cause was a trivial one. So was that of the great Indian rebellion of a few years later. And the Franco-German war of 1870 was equally without any sufficient cause, though so stupendous in its results These incidents give an air of gravity to the present disturbances in Crete. The Island is small, and its total population is not equal to that of New Brunswick. They are Christians of the Greek church and speaking the Greek language. But they are not a high-class of Christians Some modern writers claim that Paul's indictment of them, framed nearly 1900 years ago, is still true. "The Cretans were always liars, slow bellies, etc." But indifferent as may be there reputation for truth and probity they are probably better than their Turkish rulers. They are certainly desirous to throw off the Moslem yoke. Greece strongly sympathises with them and King George would like to add to his little kingdom of two millions a third of a million more. Of course the great powers, which have undertaken the control of Turkish affairs, willhave all to say about what shall take place Neither Greece or Turkey can move without their permission, but the powers are divided in sympathy, are mutually mancevering for advantage, and may at any moment break into hostilities with each other. The present danger is that some act may array the great powers in a struggle such as the world has not yet seen. Or the war-cloud may blow over harmlessly as so many threatening clouds have done before.

That such a fire could occur in such a place as occurred last week in the Western Departmental Block at Ottawa is one of the things no fellow can understand. The building is as near fireproof as it could be made, well supplied with water, hose and night watchmen, and yet two thirds of the vast block appears to have been gutted by fire or deluged with water in a few hours. The loss will be very heavy and there is no insurance carried on any federal building. The incident calls for a careful inquiry and greater preeautions in future for the guardianship of our public edifices.


