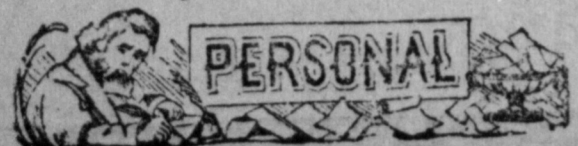

School and Temperance. A large number of sympathetic friends attended his remains to the grave where loving hands of his brother Forrester laid him to rest. LONDON, Feb. 11.—The magistrate of the Winchester Court to-day pronounced sentence upon Fraser and Amos, respectively first and second mate of the British ship George T. Hay, who have been convicted of assaulting a seaman named Roston, during a voyage of the ship from Montevideo to Rio Janeiro, from the effects of which treatment the man died.

[Fraser is said to be a provincialist, but it is not known exactly where he belongs. The second mate, Noel Amos, hails from Bay Verte, and is a brother of Mr. Dr. Fillimore of Spencer's Island. He is 25 years of age. Fifteen other members of the crew were charged with complicity in the case.]
