Mr. W. D. Carter appears for Basile E. Johnson and Henry O'Leary whose names are on the bond, to state that they claim no liability on it. Mr. Johnson states that he asked to be relieved from his liability.

Moved by Councillor Wathen, seconded by Councillor Murray and resolved that a committee be appointed—Councillors Peters, Comeau and F. X. LeBlanc to take all legal steps necessary on the Caie bond, but not to press the suit unnecessarily.

List of Parish officers Richibucto, read and approved for 1897.

Resolved that the Council appoint valuers.

Resolved that James L. Hutchinson, Calixte P. Richard and Theodore Langis be appointed valuers.

Ordered that \$1200.00 be assessed on County for debentures.

Moved by Councillor Comeau, seconded by Councillor McKee that R. A. Irving be Secretary for the ensuing year.

Moved by Councillor Peters, seconded by F. P. Richard that W. D. Carter be Secretary.

Moved by Councillor Murphy, seconded by Councillor F. M. Richard that Geo. V. McInerney retain his position.

On the amendment to the amendment being put twelve Councillors voted that Geo. V. McInerney be retained as Secretary. Yeas: Councillors McMaster, Barribeau, A. D. LeBlanc, Bourgeois, F. M. Richard, Daigle, Murphy, Wathen, Murray, Atkinson, Peters, F. P. Richard—12. Amdt to amdt., carried.

Resolved that W. D. Carter be appointed Auditor for ensuing year at \$30 per year.
