That the present condition of affairs can be charged to anyone or even to several individuals, is not now asserted. There has been and is severe blame to be apportioned, but yet no one can point to anyone in particular and say, "Thou art the man." The fault is in the system.

In Ontario they have a system of toll ga'es that would not be tolerated in N. B. We often bear a good deal of boasting as to Sir Oliver Mowatt's administration in that province but this is often the result of ignorance as to his modes. If our farmers in coming to town had to pay toll at two or three gates on their way, they would not feel at all like favoring the system. However, it has one advantage-it makes some one responsible for the roads. If a man has his carriage smashed or his horse lamed, he knows who to look to, and as a consequence the roads are well kept, with the further ef. fact of inducing buyers from all parts of the world to visit Ontario.

In Quebec a different system is largely in force. Each owner of property is required to keep the roads in front of his property in repair, while the municipality looks after those going through Govt. land. These however in Quebec are not of any great extent. This system also ensures good roads, for if any damage occurs to a passer from defect in the road the owner of the property is responsible. Both these systems have good points but their application to N. B. would not be advisable. We want some system which while simple will be effective. Taken on the whole, perhaps the best system yet known is that adopted in England, A least it has satisfied that highly practical people. THE REVIEW will again take up the matter and furnish some further information on this point.

NEW BRUNSWICK OPPOSITION CAMPAIGN.

Mr. Stockton, the leader of the local opposition and two of his colleagues, have entered upon a political tour of the Province, and during the past week have been holding meetings in Victoria and Carleton counties. The newspaper reports give varying accounts of their reception. The Liberal press as a rule discount the efforts of the orators, while the Sun and other Conservative organs approve of the campaign. It may therefore be assumed that Mr. Stockton and his friends purpose organizing as a Conservative opposition. If this is the case, it will be interesting to ascertain what aid and encouragement they expect to get from the leaders and managers of the federal opposition. When these gentlemen were in power at Ottawa they took very little interest in

THE GOLD RUSH FOR THE KLON DYKE.

The Klondyke or Trondik river is a small tributary of the Yukon about two hundred and forty miles above Circle City, which is on the frontier line between the Canadian Northwest Territory and Alaska. Recent reports of most extraordinarily rish gold mines on this river, in Canadian territory, have caused intense excitement on the Pacific coast where the people are running mad and are hurrying in crowds to these Arctic regions. A shovelful of dirt is said to yield \$4 in gold and one miner secured \$135,000 worth for last winter's work. Miners are said to have returned to Victoria, B. C., from the region, with millions. The distance and the cost of reaching the district will to a considerable extent limit the rush this season, though expeditions are now fitting out in several quarters.

From Victoria to Juneau city is about eight hundred miles by sea and from A few weeks ago THE REVIEW called Junean city to the Klondyke region, across a sea of mountains, is over four hundred miles. To reach Juneau city with the provisions, clothing and tools necessary, is costly, and the rest of the journey over mountain passes on foot and down rivers

P. E. ISLAND ELECTIONS.

The local elections in the Island Province last Wednesday, resulted in the return of the Peters Liberal administration by a good working majority. The election was run on dominion party lines and the returns do not indicate any marked popular revolt against the Liberal Government, The influence of the Laurier cabinet and the dominion patronage were thrown in favour of Mr. Peters, and although it does not appear that the Conservative dominion party leaders made any organized effort on behalf of the opposigovernment, and as yet the line of provincial Legislatures in sympathy with the good. Liberal administration at Ottawa remains unbroken. If the Tupper-Forster Conservative opposition expect success they will need to do more effective work in the provincial elections.

In another column we publish despatch. es from the Klondyke gold fields, which, we think give a fair idea of the hardships to be endured in that far away northern climate. We would be sorry to discourage any one who contemplates going to that region in search of fortunes, but we would advise those about to take that step. tc "look before they leap." Frue, there is gold in abundance, but the dangers and privations to be undergone are s. serious, that few men could expect to survive them. We are aware that the hunger for gold is well nigh irresistable in human nature-men sigh for it, cry for it, lie for it, die for it, and do many other lawful and unlawful things in order to possess it, whole earth if he perish in gaining it?
