A few weeks ago THE REVIEW called attention to the deplorable condition of our public roads, and also to the serious consequences which are sure to follow a continuance of the present state of affairs.

In Quebec a different system is largely in force. Each owner of property is required to keep the roads in front of his property in repair, while the municipality looks after those going through Govt. land.

NEW BRUNSWICK OPPOSITION CAMPAIGN.

Mr. Stockton, the leader of the local opposition and two of his colleagues, have entered upon a political tour of the Province, and during the past week have been holding meetings in Victoria and Carleton counties.

The Montreal Star, commenting on the probable new departure by the Liberal Conservatives says: "It may be that the defeat of 23rd June, 1896, has taught the Conservative

a lesson to pay more attention to provincial politics instead of concentrating their energies on Federal affairs, as they have in the past, and that the Prince Edward Islanders are the first to fiercely attack the outposts, to be followed by their political allies all along the line, in the hope that some at least will be captured, and the chances of again occupying the main citadel largely increased."
