They got a young lady for company, and started out, but had not gone far before the boat upset, the wind being puffy. There was not ballast enough in the boat to sink her, and the young woman and young men clung to her until they were rescued.—Chatham World.

A SAILOR DROWNED IN PORT.—A Norwegian named Jacobsen, who came here as carpenter of the Armenia, and recently joined the Nor. barque Nellie Moody as carpenter, fell from a staging at the vessels side, Friday afternoon, into the water, and did not rise again. The barque lies at Snowball's mill wharf. It is a fatal spot. No one who falls in there is ever saved.—Chatham World.

MUST STAY IN JAIL.—At Fredericton, July 23, Judge Vanwart delivered judgment last week on application for the discharge of Simon Gotreau, Cocagne, of Kent county, from custody under the habeas corpus act. The defendant was committed for trial by J. B. Goggin, J. P., on a charge of theft and the application for discharge was made on the ground that the justice had committed him by a form of warrant which is presented for commitment of persons indicted by a grand jury. His Honor refused the application, holding that he had power under sec. 752 of criminal code to remedy the defect. He therefore made an order directing the justice to issue the proper warrant and the sheriff in the meantime to hold the prisoner. W. Vanwart, Q. C., in support of application; J. D. Phinney, Q. C., contra.

LEGAL.—Before Stipendiary R. H. Davis on Thursday of last week, the hearing took place in the matter of complaint by Henry Budd, of St. Mary, against Neil B. Sherwood, charging the latter with willfully tearing down and destroying a water fence across the south west branch of the Buctouche River on the former's land. The defence claimed a right of way across the land and the case was dismissed by the Stipendiary with costs. R. A. Irving, Complainant, H. H. James for Defendant.

On Friday last, the case of Mrs. Alberta Fisher vs. Charles S. Steeves, was heard by Justice John T. Caie. This was a charge preferred against defendant for willfully breaking and damaging the door of the dwelling house of Mrs. Fisher in St. Mary. The Justice ordered that the Defendant pay to Complainant the sum of \$2.00 as compensation for the damages, with costs of prosecution. C. J. Sayre for Complainant, W. D. Carter for Defendant.

Commissioner H. M. Ferguson was occupied Tuesday with the case of James H. McDonald vs. Frank McInerney. This was an action for wages and the defence was that plaintiff had failed to serve out the term for which he was engaged. Judgment reserved. R. H. Davis for Plaintiff, Wm. D. Carter for Defendant.

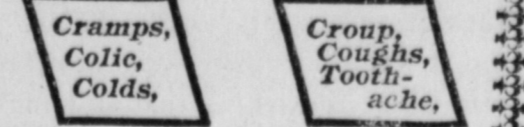

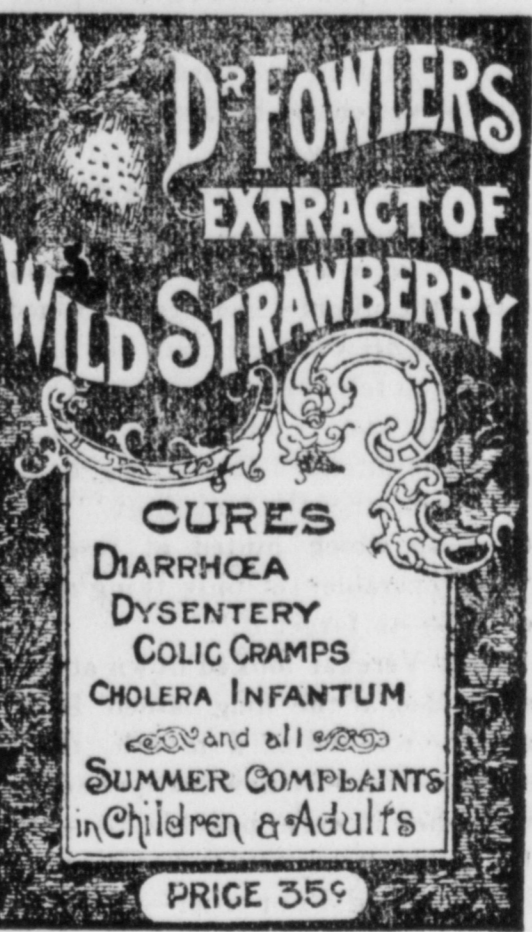

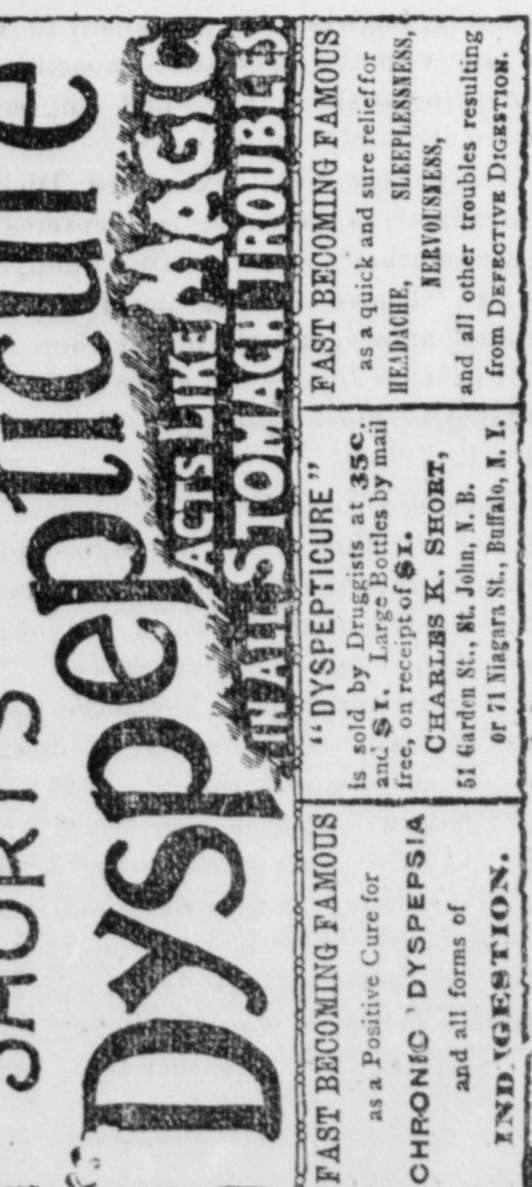
