ALBERT NOMINATION.—Saturday, 16th inst., was nomination day in Albert County for the vacant seat in the local legislature. There was a large crowd at the Court House when the proceedings opened. Hon. Messrs. Emmerson, Dunn, Farris and Iweede were among those present. C. J. Osman was nominated as a supporter of the government and J. L. Peck in opposition.

FAST HORSES.—Mr. Richard Hebert of Kingston, has purchased from J. A. Irving of Buctouche, the speedy little mare "Montrose Dot." Dot is a pure gaited trotter, and requires neither boots nor weights when speeding. Under Mr. Hebert's training it is fully expected that "Dot" will develop much more speed than she has yet shown. This mare trotted on the Kent Driving Park last Fall and had many admirers.

A NEW REGISTRY OFFICE.—Among other things attended to by the Council last week, it was decided to have a new Registry office built during the summer months. This will be good news to almost every ratepayer in the county, as the present building is in a deplorable condition, and does the county no credit. The title to every man's property is in daily jeopardy, as the vault is by no means in a fit state to resist fire. This is a commendable action on the part of the Council, and we hope they may have the work speedily carried out. Councillors Peters, McKee and Atkinson were appointed a committee to carry out the work. An assessment of \$5.0 was ordered on the county for this purpose. It is thought there is stone enough in the present building to build a new vault and put a good foundation under the new building.

COUNTY COUNCIL.—The annual session of the Kent County Council was brought to a close Saturday evening. The total indebtedness of the county was shown to be about \$17000. Much fault was found with the way in which the taxes were collected by many of the collectors in the different parishes (or rather the way in which they were not collected) many returns showing a delinquency of from 25 to 50 per cent. More attention should certainly be given to this matter, and the Councillors themselves are largely responsible for this state of affairs. They should see that none but the best men are appointed as collectors; and should also see to it that they give the work proper attention. "Richibucto" was the banner parish in respect to having the best collected list in the county. This speaks volumes for our collector, Mr. Robert Cochrane, and we congratulate him upon his work. Just before closing, a somewhat interesting scene took place, brought about by the nomination of S. A. Irving for the County Secretaryship, on motion of Councillor Comeau seconded by Councillor McKee. This brought forth strong protests from Councillors Richard, Peters, Atkinson and Murphy, all urging the retaining of their present secretary, G. V. McInerney. On motion of Councillor Wathen, Mr. McInerney said a few words in connection therewith, after which three names were put in nomination, namely: R. A. Irving, W. D. Carter and G. V. McInerney. A vote being taken, it was found Mr. McInerney had a majority and the Warden declared him duly elected and appointed County Secretary, which declaration was received with much applause. A discussion then took place with reference to the voting of themselves \$3.00 per day. This was strenuously opposed by Councillor Richard of St. Louis. It ended in \$2.50 per day being voted, this is \$1.00 a day more than they hitherto received and means \$100 extra to the ratepayers of the county for the management of their municipal affairs. W. D. Carter was appointed Auditor and K. B. Forbes, Treasurer.

At Scovill's Mill excellent meetings were held. Mr. H. A. West of this place is one of the most persevering and enthusiastic workers in the County. Rev. Mr. Ramsay was also present. There was an excellent attendance both of old and young.

At all of these meetings Supts. teachers pastors and young and old people interested in S. Sch. work were present and received valuable help.

As a result the work of the County will go forward. These meetings rally and enthuse the workers. There is not a school in the County but is reached by this Association which has done great things in the way of instructing workers in better methods and in urging upon young and old the cardinal importance of the Sunday School. It is hoped that when the reports for 1897 are made up we will be able to see progress in every school in the County. Surely no school will be willing to report no progress. How many Schs. will have Home Study and Normal Classes.
