GAME PROTECTION.—The plan of closing up the rivers and lakes of this province against everybody who desires to fish them ought to be changed. Obituary.

The death of Mr. Thomas Scott, which occurred at the residence of his eldest daughter, Foundry Street, Moncton, on February 2nd, removes another "of the old land marks" of Kent County.

Mr. Scott was born in Dumfries, Scotland in November 1815, came out to America when only a little boy, and settled in Galloway.

At the age of twenty-two, he married a Miss Smith, a native of Edinburgh, Scotland. They had twelve children—nine boys and three girls. They all survive him with the exception of one boy, who died in his eighth year.

James, the eldest, lives at Pine Ridge Kent Co., and is in his fifty-ninth year; John lives in Richibucto; Jane and Edward, in Moncton; Janet in Northumberland Co.; William in Jardineville; Robert, in the United States; Thomas in Buctouche; David, in Moncton; Peter, in the States, and Maggie in Kings Co. These were all married except the eldest daughter, who keeps a boarding house on Foundry St., Moncton. It was with this daughter that Mr. and Mrs. Scott were living when the former died.

Mrs. Scott is in her seventy-eighth year and is quite smart for her age.

Big Fire At Newcastle.

NEWCASTLE, Feb. 8.—A disastrous fire occurred Sunday night. Ten buildings were burned along Water street. There was very little insurance.

The fire started in Mrs. Wheeler's barn. She lost her house and barn; \$800 insurance.

H. Phinney, stove merchant, lost the stock in his shop and the adjoining building used as a lock up by the town; no insurance.

Mrs. Demere, milliner, lost her stock. The building was owned by James Robertson.

James Randle's feed store was destroyed and he lost part of his stock. The building was owned by James Doyle.

The Era office and presses, also Wm. Smallwood's dwelling on the Public wharf are a total loss.

The engine house was burned. It is partly insured. The boiler of the fire engine was burned out. The fire was got under control about noon.

The burned District extends from Creaghan's to the public wharf and all the buildings on the wharf down to Johnson & Co's. The small hand engine was broken and the steam fire engine was destroyed in getting it out of the engine house, so that the fire had full sway, and if it had not been for a light fall of snow and sleet the fire would have been much more serious. It is almost impossible to get a full list of insurance, but it will not total over \$30,000.

Donald Morrison's store and stock was destroyed; only \$2,000 insurance.

Mr. Rundle's stock is insured for \$750 in the Union and \$750 in the Phoenix of London. The Johnston building is insured for \$600 in the Union. Mrs. Jane Wheeler has \$400 on her building in the Sun Company. She also has \$300 on her piano. George Staples' building is insured for \$300 in the Sun. The engine house is insured for \$300 in the Atlas.

The executive committee of the Dominion legislative board of railway employees interviewed Hon. Mr. Laurier at Ottawa Thursday and asked that a commission composed of one member appointed by the railway organization and another by the government be empowered to investigate all charges upon which dismissals from the I. C. R. had been made or were threatened. The operation of the United States alien labor law as it affects Canadian railway men was also discussed. The Premier renewed the assurance he gave the Canadian railway man's representative in September last, namely that unless the Americans mitigated the unfair operation of their alien labor law, as against Canadians, he would see to it that an alien labor law, word for word agreeing with American legislation, would be passed by the Dominion Parliament. As to the I. C. R. dismissals that matter will come up in the cabinet.
