BUTOUCHE SCHOONER SEIZED.—The Schr. Phantom, of Buctouche, was seized on Monday of last week at Curtain Island in Richmond Bay for having under-sized oysters on board. The seizure was made by Mr. R. J. Milligan, fishery warden, the schooner afterwards being taken charge of by Overseer John Davison. Instructions were received yesterday from Ottawa authorizing the confiscation of the oysters and the infliction of a fine of \$20.00.

SUDDEN DEATH AT COATESVILLE.—The residents of Coatesville, Kent county, were much surprised yesterday morning to learn of the death of Mr. Simon D. Collet during the night. Mr. Collet had retired in his usual good health but when his wife awoke about 3 o'clock in the morning she found that something was wrong and ran to the nearest neighbor, a few rods away, for help and when she returned they found that Mr. Collet had passed away. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.—Times.

DEATH OF EDWIN BOWSER.—Mr. Edwin Bowser, son of the late Wm. Bowser, Merchant, Kingston, died suddenly at Saranac Lake, New York on Wednesday 2nd, inst., in the 35th year of his age. Mr. Bowser had for about a year been suffering from tuberculosis. In the hope of prolonging his life, he travelled over a great portion of the U. S. and Canada last year, and finally took up his residence at Saranac. He visited his home in Kingston in March last and when he returned to New York he was accompanied by his mother and sister who remained with him until he died, when they returned to Kingston with the body. Mr. Bowser appeared to be keeping fairly well until a few days before his death when he was seized with hemorrhage of the lungs which brought about his death thus suddenly. The interment took place at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Cemetery on Saturday afternoon. The deceased, having been a member of Court Favorite, I. O. F. that court as well as court Adogwasook attended inregalia. The large attendance at the funeral showed the esteem in which the deceased was held. Rev. Mr. Herdman conducted the funeral services. Mr. Bowser was a model young man, and his early death is regretted by a large circle of relatives and friends. Dr. J. C. Bowser, of Kingston, N. Y., brother of the deceased, also accompanied the body here.

NEW BRUNSWICKER APPOINTED.—The selection of Mr. Fred M. Cowperthwaite, B. A., as Inspector of Schools for the Province, will be generally commended. 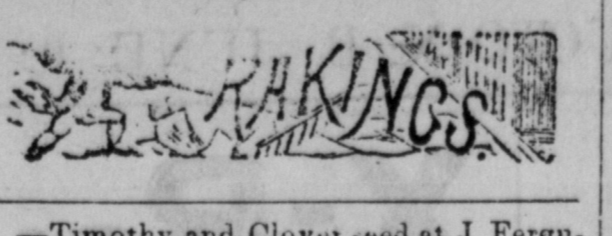
