DUMINIUN PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, May 25.-When the House opened to-day Hon. Mr. Davies introduced a bill amending the steamship inspection act by authorizing third class engineers to take charge of engines of a certain horse power, instead of as now the engines of ships of certain tonnage. Fourth class engineers who are now allowed to act as assistants to second class engineers, are authorized to assist first class engineers. The department of maiine may authorize uncertificated engineers to act as engineers on small boats in special cases.

When Hon, Mr. Fielding moved the house into committee he explained the amendments which he proposed to make aesolutions by proposing some fifty amendments to them. The amended tariff on books reads : Novels or literature of similar character, unbound or paper bound, not to include Christmas annuals or publications commonly known as juvenile and toy books, 20 per cent., books, printed pamphlets, n. e, s., not including blank account books or copy books, 10 p. c. On the free list are placed all books on the application of science, relating to agriculture, horticulture, forestry, fishing, mining, metallurgy, architecture, electricity and other engineering, carpentry, shipbuilding, machinery dyeing, bleaching, tanning, weaving and other mechanical arts and similar indus.




