AN EVENING WITH IAN MACLAREN.—A goodly number had the pleasure of listening to the Rev. Wm. Hamilton's readings from Ian MacLaren's "Beside The Bonnie Brier Bush" on the evening of July 29th in Kingston Hall. After the chairman I. W. Doherty M. D. had given some of his early experience dating back sixty-one years in the study of the Scottish dialect and telling how he finally came to grief over the Gaelic, he introduced the lecturer of the evening who opened his subject by some quaint and instructive remarks on some of the different styles of late writers, classifying Barry and Watson (Ian MacLaren) as having taken a departure from others moulded a new furrow distinctively their own.

In this departure Watson had delineated some phase of the dour Scottish character as found in "Drumtochty." The lecturer could not find time to go fully into all the characters therein portrayed, but those he did take up he handled in such a masterly way that is only permitted to the "manner born." His delineation of Elspeth Macfadyen "the sermon taster" was admirable especially her criticism of one of Maister Pettendrihs finches viz: Noo ma friends, a' weell no be keepin' ye any longer and ye'll a'gae hame tae yer ain hooses and mind yer ain business. And as soon as ye get hame ilk man'll gae tae his closet and shut the door and stand for five minutes, and ask himself this solemn question, "Am I a goat?" Amen.

But when he read with pathos "The Doctor's Last Journey" many in the hall were seen using their pocket handkerchiefs even the chairman had some difficulty with his nose. Takin' the lecture with the readings altogether it is seldom the privilege of a Kingston audience to enjoy its equal.—Com.
