SMUGGLED LIQUOR.—Last Thursday, Collector Johnson and Tidewater Russ, made a raid on the Kent Northern hotel, Kingston, and seized 19 cases of brandy and 17 cases of gin. The liquor was brought to town for safekeeping. No instructions have yet been received from the customs department as to the disposal of the liquor. As it has been reported that liquor was stored in other places, the officers are still continuing the search.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.—On Monday, while driving from Kouchibouguac to town, Mrs. McNight, an old lady of the former place, was severely injured about the head by being thrown out of a wagon. She, with another old lady, was driving to town and a horse driven by Harvey Potter was coming behind. The shaft of Potter's wagon became detached and his horse took fright, upsetting the wagon containing the women. Mrs. McNight fell beneath the wagon which passed over her head inflicting some severe bruises.

SAYS HE WAS ROBBED.—A. C. Graham, of Main River, reported having been robbed Saturday night, between Kingston and Mill Creek, by a number of masked men, who succeeded in relieving him of about two hundred dollars in cash. He had two lady companions with him at the time and they also were compelled to "hold up their hands." Graham had been delivering books for which he was agent, and had collected a good sum of money which he had displayed in Kingston during the afternoon. Few people take any stock in the story as highway robbery is one of the vices which has not yet reached this vicinity.

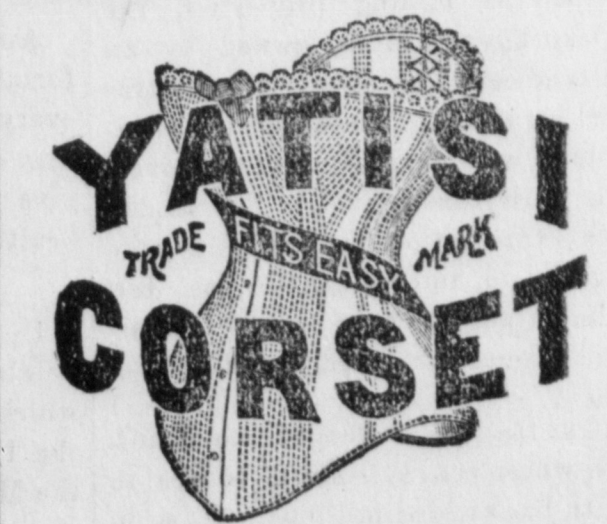
