SMUGGLED LIQUOR.—Last Thursday, think Collector Johnson and Tidewaiter Russ, made a raid on the Kent Northern hotel, Kingston, and seized 19 cases of brandy and 17 cases of gin. The liquor was cought to town for safekeeping. No instructions have yet been received from the customs department as to the disposal of the liquor. 


