CIRCUIT COURT.—The case of the Queen vs. Leger for rape was tried Wednesday, Mr. Sayre prosecuting. The parties live in the Parish of St. Paul, where the alleged offence took place.

The civil case of Morris vs. McDermott et al was settled by defendant purchasing from plaintiff his farm which lay next to defendant's farm and the dividing lines of which were in dispute in this cause.

On Friday, the second trial of Edward Kinsella for rape took place, the jury having disagreed on the first trial. Mr. Sayre prosecuted and Mr. Hutchinson, Q. C., and Mr. Richardson defended.
