CHANGE OF TIME ON CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.—The Fall and Winter time table of the C. P. R. takes effect on Monday, October 4th: trains leave St. John at 6.25 a. m. for all points on line in New Brunswick, and Bangor, Portland and Boston: at 4.10 p. m. for St. Stephen, Houlton, Woodstock, Bangor, Portland and Boston, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and all points West, North West and on the Pacific Coast, this train runs through without change of cars Halifax to Montreal leaving Halifax at 7.00 a. m. and but one change between Halifax and Boston, that is at Vanceboro, or, if passengers desire through sleeping car accommodations, at St. John; also at 4.45 p. m. for Fredericton and all intermediate points.
