TYPHOID FEVER RAGING.—Chatham is experiencing another severe visitation of typhoid fever. The hospital is full, there being fifteen patients there. Mr. and Mrs. Z. Tingley are among the latest to be stricken down with the disease. The fever is probably caused by drinking well water, and water poisoned by the graveyard at the source of the springs that supply part of the town.

BUCTOCHE RACES.—There are 7 entries in the 2.40 class and more expected to enter, comprising horses from Amherst, Moncton, Newcastle, Kingston, Buctouche and P. E. Island. In the green race there are 6 entries at present, and it is thought that the 3 minute class will fill, as at time of writing all the entries have not been received. DIED AT CHATHAM.—On Monday, the 27th Sept., John Cantwell died at his home in Chatham, after a brief illness. The funeral which took place on Tuesday was largely attended. Messrs. Thos. and James Cantwell and Mrs. Noah McLean of Campbellton and Mr. Andrew Anderson, of Dorchester, the deceased's brothers and sisters attended the funeral. SCHOOL MEETING.—The annual school meeting was held in the Grammar School room Saturday, Oct. 9th at ten a. m. John T. Caie, Esq., elected chairman. Trustees reports and secretary's accounts were read and showed after having paid teachers salaries, insurance, interest on indebtedness and two hundred and fifteen dollars reducing bonded indebtedness, wood and the ordinary running expenses of the school, there was a balance on hand of \$727.97 to meet payment of teachers salaries at the close of present term and the interest on district indebtedness due Jan. 20th 1898, to pay of \$200.00 dollars of the indebtedness, Jan. 20th 1898 also to pay insurance, wood and the ordinary running expenses of the school during the winter. The auditor's report was submitted and trustee reports and accounts were found correct. Allen Haines the retiring trustee was unanimously re-elected trustee, W. D. Carter, was re-elected auditor. The trustees were ordered to borrow the amount due by the district, at a lower rate of interest than five per cent. if possible. The matter of engaging a teacher to teach French, was again under discussion, and the matter was again left with the trustees to consider and report on at the next annual meeting. An assessment of twelve hundred dollars was ordered for the ensuing year.

The Friel Brook and Meadow Brook bridges, Salmon River, are to be repaired. A new bridge is to be built across the Wapman Quich, Molus River. The Kouchibouguac bridge is to be rebuilt and the St. Lezace bridge across the Kouchibouguac River is to be repaired. Mr. Barnes said he could assure the electors that there would be no general election for at least two years.

—The funeral of the late Miss Sarah Forster, who died at Dorchester Saturday morning, took place here on the arrival of the train Monday afternoon and was largely attended. The interment was made in the C. E. Cemetery. The remains were accompanied here by Warden Forster, brother of the deceased, and Mr. Wm. Powell, of Moncton. The pall bearers were Messrs. Chas. J. Sayre, Wm. Hudson, John D. McMinn, Martin Flanagan, Robert Phinney and D. McDermott. All the school children marched in procession as Miss Forster had been a teacher in this school for a number of years. Rev. Mr. Freeborn of Harcourt conducted the services at the church and grave. The deceased lady was 59 years old.

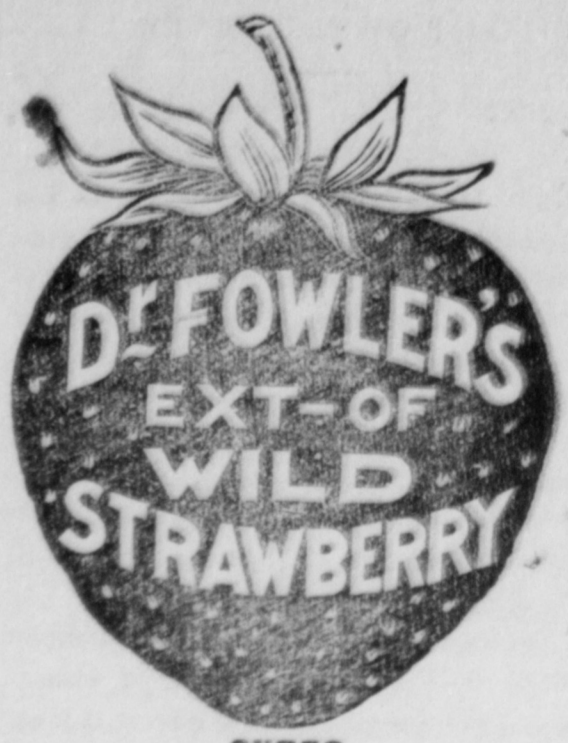
